CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 29.—The British vessels, six submarines of the British Atlantic fleet have arrived to-night. The canneries at Shediac turn out from seventy-five to one hundred cases per day during the season. They have taken in as many as one hundred and one thousand pounds of lobsters in one day. These figures give an idea of the size of this industry taking into consideration that this is only one of the factories on the coast. The majority of the lobsters in the world are along the coasts of the Maritime Provinces.

Shediac Man Says Market For Lobsters Slowly Improving

E. Patrel, of Shediac, was in St. John a few days ago on a business trip. In conversation with a newspaper representative, Mr. Patrel, who is one of the largest shippers of live lobsters in the Maritime Provinces and conducts a canning factory in Shediac, which is considered to be the most up-to-date on the eastern coast of New Brunswick, said that the lobster market has been slowly improving for the past year. He said that the demand had increased from fifteen to twenty per cent. since last spring and was from forty to fifty per cent. better than it was in 1921.

WAR WOULD EXTEND TO THE NEXT SPRING

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Should circumstances lead to the prosecution of war against the Kemalists, military experts believe that for the present winter it would be limited to the Straits and the defense of the Ismir Peninsula. The reasons advanced are that the approaching rainy season will make the roads of Asia Minor impassable for even light artillery and that any campaign for the destruction of the Kemal army would involve the use of probably one hundred thousand troops with long lines of communication and other difficulties of a nature which brought defeat to the Greeks.

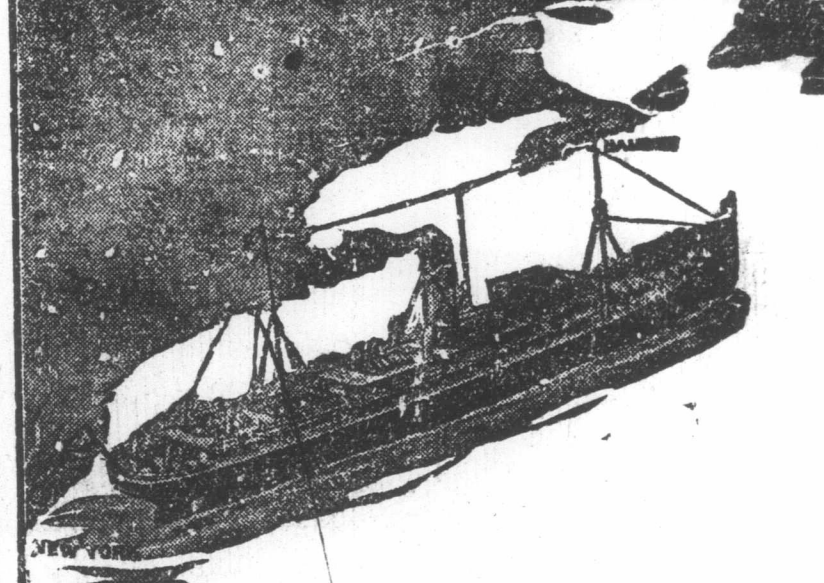

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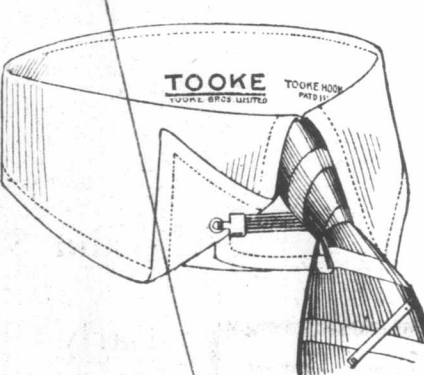

ATHENS, Sept. 29.—Alexander Zalmis, who was premier when Constantinople was expelled from Greece 1917, has been selected head of the new ministry, which is composed of Independents, Venelists, and military officers.

ANGORA, Sept. 29.—Yusuf Kemal Bey, Turkish Nationalist foreign Minister, protested to Allies against alleged atrocities and destruction of property directed against Moslems in Thrace. Unless the persecutions cease, he said, the Turkish army will invade Thrace to protect its compatriots.

MADELINE CONSTANCE ABANDONED

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—News of the destruction by fire at sea of the Barque Madeline Constance of St. John's, Nfld., was received in a wireless message to the Naval Communications Office from the Mauritania tonight. The crew were saved. The wireless message was sent by the steamship Joseph Seep and then relayed by the Mauritania. It read, "Encountered Barque Madeline Constance of St. John's, Nfld., and abandoned 37.05, west. Crew taken off." The Constance, which is listed as an auxiliary barque of 418 tons, left Rotterdam for St. John's on August 15, but was delayed a week at Falmouth, England, for repairs. She was built in 1894 and is the property of Job Brothers, St. John's.
