AGRICULTURAL TRAIN ON THE C.P.R. COMING.

H. P. Timmerman, Industrial Commissioner for the C.P.R., has written to William Downie, general superintendent of the Atlantic Division, enclosing the timetable of the movements of the agricultural instruction train. Mr. Timmerman says that owing to the difficulty of getting farmers in Quebec and New Brunswick together during planting, the agricultural department officials had told him that it would not be desirable to bring the train here until June. Accordingly the train will be in Ontario until that month and it is hoped that some of the department officials from this province and Quebec will accompany it. Enclosed in the letter was advertising matter. These were a folder with the dates at which the train might be expected to be at different points. There was also a poster with a general description of the train. This consists of nine coaches, four with illustrative and demonstration matter, three for lecturing purposes and the train crew and staff. There will be ten or fifteen lecturers and demonstrators on the train.

WILD FLOWERS IN FEBRUARY.

The Observer acknowledges the receipt from Mrs. Chas. T. Bover of East Florenceville, of a bouquet of pansies plucked from her outdoor garden on Feb. 22. The buds were thrifty and when the stems were placed in water the petals opened wide.
