

FEARFUL CONFESSION.

Survivors of the Elingamite Admit Drinking the Blood of Their Companions.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—This correspondent of the Daily Mail at Wellington (N.Z.) cables that the eight survivors of the steamer Elingamite who were rescued from a raft by the British survey steamer Penguin, admit that while their minds were unimpaired by hunger some of them prolonged life

by drinking the blood of their companions. The correspondent adds that the story of the survivors has caused a feeling of horror in Wellington, their action being regarded as inexcusable, as the raft was only four days and a half afloat.

TRANSVAAL FINANCES.

Great Banking Firm Decreasing the Capital of Their Bank.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The South African gold share market was thrown into a state of demoralization yesterday afternoon in consequence of the statement by J. B. Robinson, Chairman of the Robinson South Africa Bank, that the state of business was such as to induce the directors to recommend the reduction of the bank's capital by £3,000,000. The inference at once drawn was that if the Robinson Bank could not see its way to the profitable employment of £3,000,000 in the Transvaal, Robinson and his colleagues must entertain a poor opinion of the Rand as a field for banking, and that matters must be in a bad way as a business which was paying well a few years ago had ceased to do so, in spite of the fact that the country was now enjoying the blessings of British rule.

OBITUARY.

The death of William McGloin, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick McGloin-St. John, occurred yesterday after a long illness from consumption. Deceased was very well known and highly esteemed by his friends. The death of William F. O'Brien at the age of 71 occurred yesterday morning in the Mater Misericordia House, Sydney street, St. John. Deceased leaves a brother, John O'Brien, in the North End.

BANK CHANGES.

Resignation of Manager of Bank of Nova Scotia at Montreal.

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—Official announcement was made today of the resignation of John P. Blais, local manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia. He will join the Montreal Stock Exchange, having paid \$25,000 the other day for a seat. Mr. P. Blais will be succeeded in the bank by W. P. Hunt, now manager at Kingston, Jamaica, who will be succeeded by A. H. Rowley, now one of the bank's inspectors. It is also announced that Charles M. Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, is to join the board of the Merchants Bank of Canada.

AMERICANS ANXIOUS.

They Do Not Like to Send us So Many Settlers.

TORONTO, Nov. 19.—That the western Americans are becoming alarmed over the increasing exodus of Americans to this country is shown by the arrival here on Saturday night of Mr. Raymond, a staff correspondent of The Chicago Tribune, in search of full details of Mr. Egan's great colonization scheme in new Ontario. Mr. Raymond had a couple of interviews with Mr. Thomas Southworth, Director of Colonization, and left for Ottawa. From there he will go to the Canadian west to inquire into the extent and nature of the American invasion. He expressed to Mr. Southworth the astonishment of his people on their realization that they were getting old, as shown by the fact that settlers were leaving there for another country. The impression left by his conversation is that a movement is on foot to compel the Washington Government to undertake large irrigation works in the great sub-arctic belts of the American west, that they may have land on which to settle their own surplus population.

PLAGUE AT ODESSA

Had Its Origin in a Very Curious Manner.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 19.—The epidemic of plague which has been raging in Odessa for five months had its origin in a curious way. An Austrian vessel arrived at Odessa with one of its crew dead. The body was buried in the Catholic cemetery. During the ceremony the Austrian flag was hoisted over the grave. At the conclusion of the service the flag was carried away by two seamen of the ship who, on the way to the quay to board the vessel, stopped at several saloons. In each place they laid down the flag while getting their drinks. Shortly afterwards the two seamen died of the disease, and it was discovered that the people in every public house they had entered were ill of the plague. This has led to the belief that the flag contained plague bacilli in its folds.

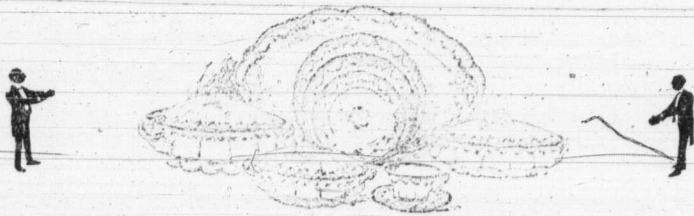
