BRITISH COLUMBIA'S CLAIMS.

The claims of the Province of British Columbia for more generous subsidy treatment are being investigated by the Dominion Government. These claims, involving millions of dollars and millions of acres of land, are very old. They were repeatedly pressed before the Laurier Government and are often neglected. Under the Borden Government they are now in a fair way to a satisfactory adjustment.

British Columbia was not represented at the inter-provincial conference of 1902, but in the printed proceedings of that conference there appears a letter signed by the Hon. E. G. Prior, then Premier of British Columbia, in which the provincial situation was fully discussed.

In later years delegates from British Columbia repeatedly came to Ottawa seeking an adjustment of all differences. The claim of British Columbia took tangible form, however, at the inter-provincial conference of 1906, when Mr. McBride so impressed the conference with the justice of the provincial contention that the delegates from the other provinces unanimously decided to offer British Columbia an additional allowance to the amount of \$100,000 annually for ten years.

It is in fulfillment of the promise made by Mr. Borden that the two governments are coming together through a royal commission to endeavor to reach an amicable settlement of British Columbia's claims. Mr. Z. A. Lash, K.C., of Toronto, has been named Dominion commissioner, Mr. E. V. Bodwell, K.C., of Victoria, has been chosen as the British Columbia representative, and in the course of a few days it is expected that the name of the umpire or chairman will have been announced by the Colonial Secretary, he having been requested to make a nomination. Mr. J. E. Martin, K.C., hatter of the Montreal bar, has been appointed Dominion counsel, while Attorney-General Bower, of British Columbia, will act in the capacity for that province. The secretary of the commission is Mr. Fred Cook, the well-known journalist and former mayor of Ottawa.

The case resolves itself into two divisions, one based upon circumstances which depend largely upon historical evidence and looking to a readjustment of the arrangements by which certain lands were conceded to the Dominion in respect to the building of the Canadian Pacific and the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railways; the other has reference to the claims arising out of the peculiar physical conditions of the province on account of which a partial allowance was made in the general readjustment of the financial relations of the Dominion with the province as the result of the inter-provincial conference at Ottawa seven years ago.

It is averred that British Columbia is the only province which has had to bonus the Dominion for a railway or other enterprise purely national and imperial in its purpose, and should have been placed on the same basis as all the other provinces in relation thereto.

In brief, all original assumptions in regard to the future of British Columbia and the Canadian Pacific Railway, upon which the terms of union were based, having proved to be groundless and fallacious, British Columbia contends that the terms should be revised in accordance with the actual developments since 1885.

THE FARMER'S FRIEND.

Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, is being widely commended throughout Canada for his aggressive agricultural policy. The ten million dollars voted for agriculture has proved exceedingly popular, and by co-operating with the provincial governments Mr. Burrell has evolved a plan which has greatly increased the effectiveness of the agricultural work of both provincial and federal governments. The "Canadian," a non-partisan weekly published in Toronto, has the following eulogy of the work of Mr. Burrell which is but typical of the commendation he is receiving from all sides:

"The Englishman who is Dominion Minister of Agriculture, has made a speech at a county fair that ought to be endorsed by every newspaper and publicist in Canada. Mr. Burrell said that the ten million dollars that has been voted for the aid of agriculture in the provinces, will be spent without reference to politics. The appointment has been made according to the population of the provinces, and before the money was voted, Mr. C. C. James, former Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, laid out a scheme in conjunction with each province, so that the money will be spent where the best results will be secured."

"Mr. Burrell is a skilled farmer, of high intellectual culture. He is governed by the best traditions of public service. He is, of course, a thorough Canadian, which makes it the more gratifying for those who rejoice to call him an Englishman, to render him the warmest tribute or respect for the administration of his department."

"If the agricultural grant shall be allocated according to the population of the provinces, why should not the grant for good roads be similarly treated? The partisan enemies of the government say it is because the funds are intended to be used where they will be of the most electoral advantage, and that that is why the Senate refused to pass the bill."

"It might be argued by a captious purist, that the agricultural grant was devised to benefit the government, and that it is, therefore, as shrewdly partisan as though the manner of its distribution were nakedly political. But such a counsel is a counsel of foolish and impossible perfection. There is no reason why rectitude should put a premium on obtuseness."

"To the pure all things need not be stupid. One of the things that the so-called clever politician does not know is that the best service of the public is the best service of the party. Mr. Burrell is too wise a man to set out to wreck his party. He is too sincere a Canadian to be willing to despoil the country of its rightful dues. He is a public servant who knows the political preciousness of a good name. More power to his elbow, more success to his department!"

SIR WILFRID'S INSINCERITY.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is now taking the position that the Government ought to lower the tariff because there is a fifty-million dollar surplus. The money, he argues, ought to go back into the pockets of the people through a reduction of the duties.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has a convenient memory, or rather a convenient forgetfulness. He and his party were in office for fifteen years, counting in as free traders and staying in as protectionists. Did they reduce the tariff? They increased it in some notable instances—that of cement for one. Could they have reduced it? With Sir Wilfrid's own argument as a basis, they could have done so. Here is what the Montreal Telegraph says, in announcing the advent of its new editor, Hon. W. S. Fielding:

"Mr. Fielding has the distinction unique in Canadian history of introducing the budget for sixteen successive years, in each, of which, excepting the first after he took office, he was able to report a surplus."

Here was no less than fifteen opportunities for the application of the argument which Sir Wilfrid Laurier finds it convenient to make now that he is no longer responsible for the administration of the country's finances.
