REBELS IN FULL POSSESION OF PORT AU PRINCE

PORT AU PRINCE Wednesday-The people of Port au Prince have revolted against the government. They are on of the city. There has been no fighting with the government troops. A provisonal government has been established and Gen. Legitime has accepted the presidency of the new administration.

The events of the morning came be fore they were expected. Uneasiness was noticed throughout the night on the part of the people; but it was not thought that the outbreak would occur so quickly nor that the movement would be successful without the shedding of a drop of blood.

President Nord Alexis is still at the palace. The members of the diplomatic corps are in conference to facil-! itate the departure of the President from the Republic.

The coup has been remarkably successful. All the remaining ministers together with the high military officials under Nord Alexis, have taken refuge in the various foreign legations. These are the same men who nine months were protesting vociferously against the granting the right of refuge to unsuccessful revolutionists by the foreign diplomatic and consular representatives. Today they are only too happy to seek the protection of a foreign flag to escape the fury of the people. The only man to remain loyal to President Nord Alexis is General Camille Gabriel, his nephew, who for the last six weeks has directed the of the Alexis administration.

Gabriel is at the palace with Alexis. The movement had been well organized. The final preparations were com pleted last evening and in the early hours of the morning bands of citizens organized and armed, moved quietly about the town and took possession of various points of vantage. At night there was an outbreak of rifle fire in conspiracy had been discovered and that the fighting had begun. This was fering. however, a false alarm. Excitem reigned for a while, but it was soon learned that the firing came from an over zealous patriot. With this exception the night passed quietly, and there was nothing to intimate to the authorities that the clizens were prena ing to take possession of the cry at daybreak. The movement was directed by General Canada, member of the Senate. It is a remarkable fact that not a shot was fired. The soldiers of Nord Alexis saw that the rebels had the upper hand and they quickly let it be seen that they had no intention of starting a fight that undoubtedly would have resulted in much bloodshed. The presence of the American cruisers Des Moines and Tacoma and the French cruiser Duguay Trouin, undobutedly had a restraining influence.

Many Flying Machines Made

In the clubhouse, now devoted to the work of the Aeronautic Society, photographs of every description of air machine and models of all kinds of seria construction from kites to dirigible balloons have supplanted the portraits of famous equine racers. Already at this first practical air park in the world more than a dozen machines are completed or in the course of construction, and in connection with the whole project nothing is more significant of the practical future of the airship than the fact that most of the experimenters are men of small means wage-earners, mechanics and the like It was primarily to give an opportu rity to such men as these that the

Aeronautic Society was organized.

Perhaps the most interesting of the arious flying machines now being test ed at the new aviation grounds is the nelicopter of W. R. Kimball. Except for Maxim's dirigible it is the mos expensive and the most beautifully con structed airship in the world. Its motor is a marvel. Weighing only 125 pounds, nevertheless it develops 50 lorse power, by which the 20 propellor

In the next shed to this \$10,000 ma hine is the Williams bi-plane, so calld because of the manner in which its lanes are rigged.

In the very near future, too, the chrouder 'arrowplane' is to be tried ut according to its inventor. nachine takes its name from its form. eing low and narrow shaped like an arrow, and with its centre of gravity extremely low. This centre of gravity is expected, will give the machine steadiness and eliminate the danger of apsizing which has alweys difficulty in the air planes. The most emarkable thing about this new mahine, however, is its shape, or rather the significance of the shape. This has been followed by the usual American election depressi Leading industries have such advanages that they can afford to play with the public. The people are almost resigned to the experience of closed factories as elections approach and promises that activity will be resumed and all the old places opened if a certain candidate is elected and a certain jug-handled policy endorsed. Even artificial election depressions are felt in Canada, and our quick recovery shows that there is no organic weakless in our industrial development. It is said that some capitalists and investors are showing a lack of confi-

dence in the future markets, but this does not seem to be a perceptible influence. It is true that there have been slight decreases in wages, and every decrease proportionately lessens markets. The lessening of wages means the lessening of purchasing nower, for those who secure larger rofits are not likely to engage in lavsh personal expenditure. But the reductions which have taken place are of so little moment that they cannot naterially lessen the consuming capdemand in all lines of goods required for immediate consumption is the best possible assurance that the market will continue to keep pace in future with the present rate of expansion. The wide diffusion of comforts and the high standard of living among Canadians are the best assurance against warehouses filled with unsalable goods.
