Every attack weakens the eyes and predisposes to further attacks, which (so, at least, the Eskimos believe) finally lead to total blindness, an affliction rather common among the Eskimos. Keeping the eyes from strain and, if possible, focussing them continually on some dark object (such as a black dog in one's team), is believed by the natives to be the chief safeguard.
