RUSSIA'S NAVY. Any Battleships Made Will Be Home Made.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—The report published in England to the effect that the Russian Government had ordered five warships from a firm of Clyde shipbuilders is untrue. The Admiralty has adopted the principle that all battleships should be constructed in Russia, and it is impossible that any vessels have been ordered either here or abroad for this year.

As the Douma intends to reject the estimates on the new battleships, the programme for 1909 will probably be small.

THE CONGO. Demands Made by Great Britain Upon Belgium.

London, April 24.—It is understood that the conditions under which Great Britain is willing to recognize the annexation of the Congo Independent State to Belgium, communicated to the Belgian Government by Sir Edward Grey, the Secretary of Foreign Affairs, include the establishment of free trading and the abolition of forced labor.

The delay in the receipt of a reply from Belgium is interpreted as a sign that that Government finds it difficult to comply with Great Britain's demands, probably owing to the attitude of numerous companies holding monopoly concessions.
