by Samuel Drost. It is a pleasure to see  
the high action of the flyer while going at  
full speed.

The school is progressing well under  
our present teacher.

The Hall committee are talking of be-  
ginning the hall in the near future.

We are glad to note the stand taken by  
some of the St. John people in regard to  
compulsory education and comment on  
some time ago by the Chipman corres-  
pondent. Nothing would be of such  
importance to our province, nothing  
in the way of legislation is needed more.

It is shocking to find, even in our best  
districts, more or less children who are  
growing to the state of manhood and  
womanhood without any education what-  
ever. And it is a curious fact that these  
children are being reared, as they do  
from ignorant and unthrifty parents, they  
possess nothing in the way of hereditary  
endowments, except perhaps those per-  
verse traits which are sure to be strength-  
ened by parental example. Now the  
only remedy for this is some form of com-  
pulsion. We boast of our school system,  
but there is not an European country  
save ours, which is not superior to ours  
in this and other respects. We judge a  
country from an educational standpoint  
by its system and its intellectual produc-  
tions. Now with this as a criterion we  
find that Germany produces 27,000 new  
books every year; France 3,000; Italy,  
9,500; Great Britain, 7,300; United States  
5,300. England leads in novels, Germany  
educational and scientific works, France  
in history, Italy in political economy.

Now these countries are in the van-  
guard of education, which has been con-  
spicuous for years; at least in Germany  
and France.

Perhaps some statistics in regard to  
the cost of education in New Brunswick  
will not be amiss. We find in "Report"  
for 1899, that there were 13 Grammar  
schools in operation with 794 pupils in  
Grammar school grades. The grant to  
Grammar schools \$6,127, thus gives the  
cost to government of \$7.70 per pupil, on  
the basis of salaries to teachers \$22.00  
per pupil.

Superior Schools: Pupils in required  
grades about 730; there being 45 such  
schools in operation at cost of \$608.00  
per teacher gives closely \$35.00 per pupil  
to the country and about \$15.00 to the  
government.

Common schools: The cost per pupil  
is approximately \$2.20 per pupil to gov-  
ernment and \$5.50 to the country. Now  
the question is this: Are the secondary  
schools producing results commensurate  
with their cost compared with the pri-  
mary? And are not the poor districts ne-  
glected in their efforts to obtain a good  
rudimentary education for their children?  
We think they are, judging by a re-  
cent order of the Board of Education  
poor districts employing 1 class teachers  
can only get aid based upon allowance to  
11 class. This is not fair as out of 558  
poor districts in the province many are  
very poor and contain a goodly number  
of children.

By the above order an indirect insult  
has been given to the poorer class of peo-  
ple. You are poor! Your children there-  
fore are not supposed to be taught by a  
1 class teacher.

By the above order the best stone in  
our educational system has been re-  
moved; since it does not give the poor  
man the same chance as the rich, which

was the primary aim of our system of  
Poor Aid, and the maintaining of the  
common schools on a level with one an-  
other must be more difficult hereafter.

What we want is state control of edu-  
cation and a uniform rate of taxation.

attendance.


