Last month the Sultan received from one of his vasable a handsome revolver, set with gold and pre-cious stones, as a present, and the valuable gift was immediately transferred to the great treasure-chamber. When the place was opened and the inventory revised it was dis-covered that some of the chests and closets had been broken open and completely emptied of their precious contents.
