EDITORIAL NOTES.
THE NEW BRUNSWICK R. R. AND THE "BURPES."
The Burpes family have now a controlling influence in the New Brunswick Railroad, Hon. Isaac steps into Mr. A. Gibson's shoes as president. It is said that this road is to be extended to the St. Lawrence, the gauge to be widened and that it is to form part of the Pacific Railroad system. Ex-Speaker Anglin writing about it said:
"Mr. Gibson has sold his interest for \$800,000 and retired. His name was so thoroughly identified with this work that his unlooked for withdrawal caused much talk. Nobody appears to know what it means. Perhaps he did not care to take any part in the contract for building the Canadian Pacific."
But the Sun turned it well on the "first Commemoration" by retorting:
"The inference is that Mr. Burpes did care to take a part, etc." Perhaps Mr. Burpes fast friend, the TELEGRAPH, will rise and explain to Mr. Anglin's satisfaction?
The Burpeses of course are great Grits, and the Grits characterize the construction of the Canada Pacific as a "monstrous undertaking."

SAINT ANN'S FERRY.
At the mouth of the harbor there is a primitive ferry for persons travelling the "North Shore." The boat, the ferryman and his wife are unique. The ferry boat has a rope fastened to its bows with which it is drawn out of the water on to ways by means of a rude upright windlass, through the centre of which a pole is thrust, which is worked by two persons. The boat is broad and narrow, (about 8 feet) in the widest part. A horse, wagon and a couple of passengers can be carried over at one time. The method of operating this craft is as follows: she is brought broad side on to the smooth gravelly beach, the wagon is placed in the stern with the shafts raised aloft, and the horse is made to step into the centre of the boat which is well lined by boards. Disembarkation is done in the same manner, the shore being approached sidewise. When the beach is struck, the animal without any forcing at once wades ashore. The ferryman, a tall sturdy Highlander, speaking very few words of English, with form a little bent by age, and long hair whitened by the lapse of many winters, meets you on the shore anticipating your wishes. Your horse and wagon placed on board, you step in the bow of the boat, place yourself on the rude wooden seat and are thus rowed across. On nearing the shore he addresses a few words in Gaelic to his assistant, the boat is placed in proper position and you step ashore. The ferryman has a wife who often aids him in rowing, tugging at one or while the partner of her joys and sorrows toils at the oar. She is a stout stout lardy Highland woman. You may frequently see her standing on the road in her bare feet, with long grey hair floating to the breeze, watching the boat as it crosses. Her age must be 80 years at least, though she could not tell you exactly even if you can speak Gaelic, but she is lithe and active and steps quicker than many a girl of 16, and can even run like a fox when occasion demands. The ferryman's name is Donald McLean, his neighbour Morrison, also a Highlander and over 80 years old is the light house keeper. There is no love lost between these neighbors. The ferryman is jealous of the lighthouse keeper, because he holds that office, while the latter envies the former the emoluments of his profession. This jealousy extends to their respective ladies.

ENGLISHTOWN, ST. ANN'S.
This consists of a few scattering houses, half a dozen stores (most of them too good for the place), and several small wharves. At one time a considerable fishing business was carried on here, now there is hardly any. A good sized tannery was started here but did not succeed as there was little or no bark adjacent. A lobster factory was also in operation for one year; but owing to scarcity of fish was compelled to suspend operations.

PROTECTION IN AMERICA.
According to a speech by Mr. Gladstone, America in 12 years has reduced her National debt by £158,000,000 or by £13,000,000 a year. CAPE BRETON.
COMMUNION SABBATH.
On the 1st of August an open air sacrament was held at Boularderie Island. Men, women and children were going, some in boats, some in carriages and others on foot. At these sacraments a table is spread for the communicants and the audience seat themselves around on the grass or under the trees. An improvised pulpit is occupied by the 3 or 4 clergymen who attend. The services usually occupy 4 days. Preaching commences at 11 a. m., and the audience are dismissed at 4 p. m. As one clergyman ends his discourse another takes his place. There is no intermission for dinner which is eaten at 4 p. m. During these preparatory services some of the audience work themselves up to a great state of excitement, and throwing themselves on the ground roll from side to side, sometimes uttering wild cries. This practice is however decreasing, and is incident to the Highland Scotch alone. Sometimes as many as 3,000 or 4,000 people attend these meetings; neighboring houses are forced to contain 40 or 50 people each, while as many or more sleep in the adjacent barn. These meetings which are attended from devotional motives by the old who often walk 20 miles to be present, are frequented too often by the young as a source of amusement. The fishermen of St. Ann's Bay take up their herring nets on Saturday evening, and when they have trolls out they take up the books if there are thousands of them and remove the bait lest the Sabbath should be profaned by a fish seizing the baited hook.

SAINT ANN'S FERRY.
At the mouth of the harbor there is a primitive ferry for persons travelling the "North Shore." The boat, the ferryman and his wife are unique. The ferry boat has a rope fastened to its bows with which it is drawn out of the water on to ways by means of a rude upright windlass, through the centre of which a pole is thrust, which is worked by two persons. The boat is broad and narrow, (about 8 feet) in the widest part. A horse, wagon and a couple of passengers can be carried over at one time. The method of operating this craft is as follows: she is brought broad side on to the smooth gravelly beach, the wagon is placed in the stern with the shafts raised aloft, and the horse is made to step into the centre of the boat which is well lined by boards. Disembarkation is done in the same manner, the shore being approached sidewise. When the beach is struck, the animal without any forcing at once wades ashore. The ferryman, a tall sturdy Highlander, speaking very few words of English, with form a little bent by age, and long hair whitened by the lapse of many winters, meets you on the shore anticipating your wishes. Your horse and wagon placed on board, you step in the bow of the boat, place yourself on the rude wooden seat and are thus rowed across. On nearing the shore he addresses a few words in Gaelic to his assistant, the boat is placed in proper position and you step ashore. The ferryman has a wife who often aids him in rowing, tugging at one or while the partner of her joys and sorrows toils at the oar. She is a stout stout lardy Highland woman. You may frequently see her standing on the road in her bare feet, with long grey hair floating to the breeze, watching the boat as it crosses. Her age must be 80 years at least, though she could not tell you exactly even if you can speak Gaelic, but she is lithe and active and steps quicker than many a girl of 16, and can even run like a fox when occasion demands. The ferryman's name is Donald McLean, his neighbour Morrison, also a Highlander and over 80 years old is the light house keeper. There is no love lost between these neighbors. The ferryman is jealous of the lighthouse keeper, because he holds that office, while the latter envies the former the emoluments of his profession. This jealousy extends to their respective ladies.

ENGLISHTOWN, ST. ANN'S.
This consists of a few scattering houses, half a dozen stores (most of them too good for the place), and several small wharves. At one time a considerable fishing business was carried on here, now there is hardly any. A good sized tannery was started here but did not succeed as there was little or no bark adjacent. A lobster factory was also in operation for one year; but owing to scarcity of fish was compelled to suspend operations.

PROTECTION IN AMERICA.
