PROVINCIAL BOARD HEALTH OFFICIALS

Visit Campbellton and Also the Shippegan Dogfish Factory.

Moncton, Sept. 7.—Dr. E. O. Steeves, of Moncton, chairman of the provincial Board of Health, returned on Tuesday afternoon from a trip of inspection at Campbellton. He also visited and inspected the dogfish factory at Shippegan and the conditions he found there will be reported to the provincial Board of Health. Referring to the conditions at Campbellton, Dr. Steeves said that while they were not perfect he thought they were as good as could be expected under the circumstances. He thought the people of the fire-stricken town were doing wonders. He did not like to express an opinion as to the outlook for the winter, but he believed that with the true Canadian spirit that was being shown they would overcome every obstacle.

Dr. Steeves was accompanied on the trip by Dr. E. Fisher, of Marysville, secretary of the Provincial board.

REPORTED TO POLICE LOSS OF \$2,500 Moncton Man and Wife Arrested at St. John, but Matter was to have Been Arranged.

Moncton, Sept. 10.—About half past ten Friday morning Mr. K. Bezanon reported to Chief Rideout that he had lost \$2500, and detailed the circumstances under which he missed the money. On Thursday, Mr. Bezanon stated, he cashed a certified cheque at a local bank for \$200 and placed the money in his pocket. That same evening he visited the home of his friend, Mr. F. W. Newman, Main street, where he spent the night. When he awoke some time Friday morning he found that his money was missing, and also that he was alone in the house. This coincidence was related to Chief Rideout, and upon investigation it was learned that Mr. Newman and wife had gone to St. John on the maritime express. A wire was sent to the St. John police to apprehend the Moncton couple and this was done upon the arrival of the train at St. John. It appears that Mr. Newman and wife had gone down to the exhibition and when arrested by detective Killen they produced the money. It was explained that the money had not been stolen, and it is understood that in later developments and explanations, Mr. Bezanon expressed a desire only to have his money returned and it was stated last night matters had been amicably arranged to that effect.

POSES AS PRIEST OF CHURCH IN CHATHAM Fakir Tries to Impose on Montreal Institution and is for a Time Successful.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—Attired in the garb of a priest and claiming to be pastor of a church in Chatham, N. B., a bogus clergyman who endeavored to secure free lodgings at one of the local institutions allotted for the housing of ecclesiastics during the week of the congress, was discovered and ignominiously driven out. When the alleged priest failed to answer satisfactorily some questions in reference to the bishop of his diocese, his effort to impose on the institution was unmasked. The ecclesiastical fakir, a young man garbed in clerical attire, went to the Archbishop's Commercial academy in St. Margaret street, where twenty-five ecclesiastics are occupying quarters during the congress. He said he was a Seminarian and there was no thought that his claim was bogus until the director of the institution had his suspicions aroused. The alleged cleric was asked some questions concerning the appearance of the bishop of his diocese, and these he failed to answer satisfactorily. He was then given the alternative of producing a note from his bishop or leaving the place, and he left at once.

INSTITUTION FOR THE DEAF AND DUMB The school will reopen after the summer holidays on Monday, September 19th, when it is hoped all pupils will arrive promptly. At this school all pupils are taught to speak and to understand speech by reading the movements of the lips. There are throughout the Maritime provinces many children, not actually deaf and dumb, but deaf enough to prevent their taking advantage of the ordinary public school instruction. Such children are eligible for admission to this school and should be sent, as their speech would be greatly improved as well as their power of lip-reading. Parents are only asked upon to pay travelling expenses and furnish clothing, the institution providing board, education, and medical treatment.

President Snowball at the meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade at Chatham said: "I would suggest to towns in these provinces the encouragement of small industries, natural to the place, started is possible by local men that know the business, and that will grow naturally, rather than big industries induced by bonuses, grants and exemptions, that often fail and leave the place worse than before. We have people with money who would go into the manufacturing industry that would build up our provinces, and population. They sell their investments in the woods, and get rich in the same way.
