

ONTARIO IS STILL CONSERVATIVE

Whitney Carried Province by Equal Majority as Last Election.

SUMMARY OF ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

Liberals, 21. Conservatives, 86. To hear from—Temiskaming. By acclamation—Addington. W. J. Paul; Durham East, J. J. Preston; Lanark South, Hon. Col. Matheson; Muskoka, A. A. Mahaffy; Simcoe South, Alex. Ferguson; Victoria East, J. H. Carnegie.

Ontario, June 8.—The Liberal party in Ontario today has passed under the rod, but while the reports at first were of a most severe reverse, the latter returns show that the party will not be much worse off than in the former house, either in membership or ability.

The power policy helped the government. There is no question that it earned the goodwill of the people throughout Western Ontario, and other parts of the province, particularly in the Niagara frontier, where there was a feeling against it, and some of the most prominent capitalists of the province, who always support the Conservative cause, being touched in their pockets by the government going into the distribution of power to manufacturers, turned against their first love and supported the Liberal cause with purse and voice, not with the object of electing the opposition as co-teaching Whitney a lesson.

New Ontario Went Wrong. The results in New Ontario, especially in the mining districts, were expected to help the Liberals. There has been for the first time in the policy of the Liberal leader a strong attack on the mining administration of the government. In his last manifesto issued on Saturday morning Mr. Mackay said, "If you are opposed to giving away \$150,000 of the people's money to favorites and defending such action by the absolutely untrue statement that the former minister of crown lands had secretly given away a mine, whereas the board of arbitrators had in open court dealt with the case, vote for the Liberal candidate."

The school policy, whereby model schools are abolished except in New Ontario, was also regarded as a mistake which is leading to a dearth of teachers. The Normal schools are training teachers for the West, because they are qualified to go directly there and teach, and at least 25 per cent. of the graduates of the Normal schools for the past five years are now teaching in the West. Model school teachers, on the other hand, all remain in Ontario.

The law which undertook to force rural trustees to pay higher prices to teachers was resented by that class in strong terms. The teachers, however, ever approved of it. The temperance question played a pretty large part in the speeches, but it does not appear to have secured many votes. There was a good deal of criticism of the three-fifths clause which required a majority of sixty per cent. for any local option, and the same majority to repeal it. As, however, no very large majority of temperance men belong naturally to the Liberal party, the government had little to fear from their disapproval, and the results show no change on that account.

"abolish the bar." This is a great residential section, but the result was not flattering to him. Prestruck an attitude in provincial politics. They virtually said to the electors, "Here is the government's record. It is clean. We have abolished abuses under the Ross government. We have fulfilled our promises except as to law reform, which will be our next work. Judge us on that." These consequences were few and far between. Premier Whitney stayed in Toronto most of the time, delivering only five or six speeches, on the side, and the other ministers were in the vicinity of their own constituencies. While the election was on, Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of mines, did effective work among the mining and lumbering regions of the north, but he was the only one who appeared to exert himself. There was some resentment among the lumbermen at their treatment by the government, but as the rulings have been fairly just, if rough, and in the interests of the people as a whole, their resentment only counted in the Renfrew district.

The Liberal party is in better shape as a whole as a result of the election. Mr. Mackay took up the work with shattered and disorganized forces and with his energy and undoubted gifts as a law reformer put his party into fighting trim once more and made as fine a campaign as the province ever saw. He has alienated no one, and when the next battle comes to be fought there will be a different story to tell.

A Dangerous Majority. Toronto, June 9.—The Globe says editorially today: As a result of today's election the governing majority in the legislative assembly of Ontario will be very considerably increased. No matter what the causes, legitimate or illegitimate, every true friend of the government and every true and thoughtful citizen will regret the result. Premier Whitney, instead of being strengthened, is in reality in a more dangerous position than he was in the last parliament. He must be dull, indeed, if he is not apprehensive of the perils inseparable from so large a majority. He knows, and men who have been near to the facts of the situation know, that before dissolution indications of weakness and wrong-doing began to manifest themselves in the baser circles of the government's supporters. Men who are in politics for their private and selfish reasons and who are ready to sacrifice public interests and their party's good name to their private gain—such men are in both parties—will now assert themselves and will combine to secure their ends. The very strength of the majority will yet prove a source of weakness to the government.

The new houses swept clean during the first year or two. Now that the corrupt elements of the party both within and without the legislature feel secure in its place of power, the restraints of the first term will be thrown aside and the vulnerable points in the government, of which there are many, cannot withstand their attack. For the Opposition the situation is not changed. The Liberals have had one term in opposition. They gave the government every advantage of a hand and generous treatment. They now know what to expect. The principles of Liberalism are more largely accepted by the Legislature today than ever before. For those principles and for their application to the problems pressing for solution in Ontario the Liberals must stand more immovable and more aggressively than ever. The loud and arrogant shout of a mere brute force majority signifies nothing. No true Liberal will be discouraged by yesterday's election. There was only one incident. If it helps the Liberals in Ontario to face the whole situation with steadiness and insight, and to set themselves more definitely and unmistakably on Liberal grounds, unswervingly loyal to the people's rights, the loss of yesterday will find in tomorrow a gain to match.

FORCE THEM INTO POLITICS. President of Brewers' Association Discusses Local Option Laws. Milwaukee, June 8.—Six hundred brewers from all parts of the country have arrived in Milwaukee to attend the national convention of the United States Brewers' Association. They represent investments in business amounting to about one billion dollars. Despite the prohibition wave going over the country, they looked cheerful. Concerning questions to be considered during the convention, which opens tomorrow, President Julius Liebman said to-night: "The most important question before the present convention of the United States Brewers' Association is not prohibition, but the local option laws. These laws will make it necessary for brewers, in self-protection, to get into politics. They will constantly keep the saloon question agitated and the racer thus engendered will make it difficult to settle the question on its merits. The brewers are engaged in a legitimate business and the local option laws afford a constant menace for interference."

POWER QUESTION IN HAMILTON. Private Company Offer Power at Ten Per Cent. Less Than Government. Hamilton, June 9.—Hamilton expects, by a vote of the ratepayers this month, to settle the Niagara power question, which has been agitating the city for two years or more, and on the public's verdict will depend whether there is to be a municipal plant using hydro-electric power or another contract with the Ontario Power Company. In January, 1907, by an overwhelming majority, the people endorsed a by-law authorizing the council, if it thought it advisable, to sign a contract with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission and to build a municipal plant at a cost of \$225,000 for street lighting, pumping water and operating the sewage disposal plant. The by-law, however, stipulated that the price of power should not exceed \$17.50 per horse power. The government has since refused to guarantee their estimates, and if Hamilton signs a contract it will have to take its chances on the price of power, although Premier Whitney has promised that the transmission lines will not be a burden on the city's treasury. The Cataract Company's offer, in writing, to supply the city with power at a price of 10 cents per kilowatt hour for government power has put the question in a new light. Hamilton enjoys a unique position in this matter. By many years first to solve the great problem of electricity in a practical way. When the W. B. & A. railway company's offer was rejected across the border was first thinking of the possibility of Niagara power, Hamilton was working the scheme out in the city.

EIGHT KILLED IN COLLISION. Confusion of Orders Causes Disaster in Annapolis. Annapolis, Md., June 8.—In a head-on collision between two special cars of the W. B. & A. railway company, shortly before eight o'clock to-night, eight persons were killed outright and six years old daughter of the injured, some of them perhaps fatally. The collision was due to a confusion of orders as the line has been running several extra cars each way in connection with the commencement of the naval academy. The dead are: Richard Norton, 25 years old, Baltimore; A. H. Schultz, 40 years of age, Baltimore; Police Patrolman Schreiber, 40 years of age, employed by the railway company at Academic Junction; an unidentified white woman, apparently about 25 years of age, said to be from the Baltimore, and dressed in ball costume; Beach O'Neil, New York metropolitan of one of the wrecked cars; Ruth Slough, six years old, daughter of General Traffic Master William W. McDaniel; Baltimore; George White, Baltimore.

ONLY 37 MEMBERS PRESENT. Most Conventions Here in Quebec and Ontario To-Day. Ottawa, June 9.—The election day sitting began in the House of Commons at 10 o'clock with an attendance of 37 members, 24 Liberals and 13 Conservatives. On motion to go into supply, the House adjourned for the day. The circular issued by the Intercolonial management that salaries would not be paid until more money was available by parliament. The fact was that the minister of railways had not asked for these votes, and they were held up by his absence in the Ontario elections. Hon. Mr. Fielding in reply said that the minister and all his other colleagues in the cabinet had given their vote on account, but had been granted only an eighth. Later they had been refused another advance vote.

CZAR GOES TO MEET KING. Accompanied by Large Suite He Proceeds to Reval. St. Petersburg, June 8.—Emperor Nicholas, with other members of the royal family, accompanied by a large suite, left Petrograd last evening for Reval, where they will be met by King Edward. This is the first royal journey in any form which has been taken since the czar made the trip to Sanara on July 16, 1904, to meet the emperor of Manchuria. Extraordinary precautions will be taken along the Baltic railway.

Methodist Conference in Saskatoon. Saskatoon, June 8.—The Methodist conference is now in full session. Today an interesting paper was read by Rev. James Allan, M.A., upon the work of the general mission board. This afternoon the discussion of the latter paper was continued and the report of the Sunday school committee was presented, while tonight a big meeting in the interests of temperance and moral reform was held in the church at which Dr. Chown and Dr. Bland spoke. The conference is getting through its work in pretty good shape and should finish Wednesday noon.

Conciliation Making Little Headway. Winnipeg, June 8.—There has been little apparent progress in the work of the C.P.R. conciliation board. Morning and evening sessions were held today. Hungerford's cross-examination was finished and Temple's direct evidence and part of cross-examination taken. Most of the matters dealt with were of a comparatively trivial nature, and from the indications the hearing will take at least a month. Conditions and events are being engineered into for years back, each topic being brought out in detail. The board adjourned till tomorrow morning.

North Topeka Flooded. Topeka, Kansas, June 8.—All North Topeka is under water tonight. 8,000 people have been driven from their homes on account of the high water in the Kaw river. No one was drowned. Not a single house in North Topeka was occupied tonight. The river is rising.

PREMIER GOUIN SWEEPS QUEBEC

Entire Opposition Will Not Exceed 20 Members—Bourassa Wins in St. James.

Montreal, June 8.—All the Quebec members were safe. The latest reports show the return of 55 Liberals and 16 opposition members, two of these are Nationalists and two are Independents. The Liberal members of the legislature who met defeat are Morcier in Chateauguay (ex-tenure's seat), Bergevin in Beauharnois, a personal friend of Premier Gouin, who went down to Europe, Chertier in Laprairie, Smith in Megantic, Lisias in Montargny defeated by Bourassa's lieutenant, Armand Lavergne, and Premier Gouin himself in St. James; John in East Quebec, was defeated by Lacombe, Independent Liberal, and Champane in the Mountains was defeated by Sauve. The latest returns give LeBlanc in Laval, a majority of 14.

Total Opposition is 26. Montreal, June 8.—The situation as it looks at present is that the entire opposition to the Gouin government will number twenty, as there seems reason to believe that in the case of LeBlanc in Laval, the recent will give him the seat. Premier Gouin's only statement made for publication today was that he was sorry for his defeat in St. James; but he is satisfied with the general result.

The contest between Premier Gouin and Henri Bourassa, leader of the new Nationalist party, was the special contest of the campaign and absorbed the interest not merely of the province but of the whole country. The worst blow given the Conservatives was the defeat of Bellier, the party organizer, in Dorchester.
