

THE LABOR DAY CELEBRATION

Sports at the Exhibition Grounds were a Great Success.

An ideal day, a record-breaking crowd, and an elaborate program of harness races and athletic sports all combined to make the Labor Day celebration at the Exhibition grounds yesterday an event unparalleled in local show circles.

The attendance was a new mark for this popular annual event. The crowd in the grandstand almost equalled in proportions that of fair week at its height.

There was a diversity of events which was almost bewildering. The very novelty and uniqueness of some of the events on the program kept the crowd on edge throughout the afternoon and the grandstand was crowded until long after 6 o'clock.

Naturally contests between union men, their wives and children greatly predominated, but in addition there was a fair sprinkling of open events in which all comers were allowed to participate.
