The Hague Decision.

A week ago, Mr. Aylesworth the Minister of Justice of Canada, reviewed before the Canadian Club of Toronto the history of the Fishery Dispute and the Hague Award thereon. His remarks are of interest. He declared that Canada and Newfoundland had behind them at the "Hague" all the weight of the British Empire. The very best assistance, which Britain could give was given up. He also declares that the success of our case emphasizes among those of us who are intimately connected with it, and who know the practical value of British protection and influence, the feeling of warm gratitude, which we have for the Motherland. We are glad indeed to find such a tribute of praise merited by the Motherland. It is peculiarly gratifying to those who found it necessary to take a strong attitude in combatting the claims of the United States regarding fishery rights, and the compromising attitude and unconstitutional acts of the British Government in attempting to force upon Newfoundland the notorious Fishery Modus Vivendi. All honor to Sir Robert Bond who fought the good fight and brought the British Government to a sense of its duty to Newfoundland.
