Reception to Delegate.

The committee appointed to make arrangements for the reception of the Papal Delegate met last night at 8 o'clock in the Star of the Sea Hall. Several new members were added to the list including M. P. Cashin, W. F. Trelogan, Mogue Power and James McGrath.

The sub-committees reported progress.

A draft of the address was read by Mr. C. O'N. Conroy and voted to be engrossed for presentation.

Hon. John Harris reported on collections; Mr. E. F. Parlong on fireworks; Mr. J. C. Barter on arches.

Mr. E. M. Jackman said that the Star of the Sea had met and resolved to turn out in full numbers. He also put forward the suggestion that two tugs be engaged to take the officers and two bands out to Cape Spear to accompany the Rosalind to the harbor.

Officers of the B. I. S., T. A. C. C., C. H. N. and Mechanics' Societies reported that the bodies that they represented had met and resolved to turn out to meet the Delegate and also take part in the evening parade.

The collectors will start into work at once.

The arches will be rushed to completion as quickly as possible.

After the general meeting was over the officers of the different societies remained behind and further discussed arrangements. It was decided that the C. C. C. under Hon. D. J. Greene lead the parade as a military guard of honour. The Lieut.-Col. will marshal the whole turn out assisted by Major Donnelly on horse back.

Change in Verse of National Anthem.

The Alteration Has Been Specially Sanctioned by King George.

London, July 12.—A change has been made in the National Anthem. In these days when the main thought throughout the civilized world is peace, one of the old verses of the Anthem is said to have struck the King as sounding a somewhat discordant note. It runs:—

O Lord our God arise
Scatter his enemies—
And make them fall;
Confound their politics,
Frustrate their knavish tricks,
On him our hope we fix
O save us all.

That verse has now been replaced by the following, written by Dean Hole and breathing a more peaceful spirit:—

O Lord our God arise
Scatter his enemies—
Make wars to cease
Keep us from plague and death
Turn them our woes to mirth
And over all the earth
Let there be peace.

The alteration has been specially sanctioned by the King, and is therefore of national importance, seeing that it is now likely to be universally followed.

Risked Life for His Comrade.

The Earl of Dunmore, M.V.O., V.C. is now in his forty-second year. It was as Lieut. Viscount Pincasoff, of the 16th Lancers, that he won the soldiers' coveted decoration at Land-skiel Causeway.

The guides pursuing the enemy were ordered to hold a position and fire on the enemy retiring up the hill. Before the order could reach the leading squadron, Lieutenant Greaves was struck by a bullet and fell from his pony. Down swooped the swordsmen to cut him up, but before their knives could do their work Lieut.-Col. Adams, Lieut. Viscount Pincasoff and Lieut. McLean were amongst them.

A heavy and murderous fire was pouring into the rescuing party, and as Viscount Pincasoff lifted the wounded officer in his arms, another bullet killed Lieut. Greaves, while Lieut. McLean fell mortally wounded.

15 Year Old Boy MET AN AWFUL DEATH.

Toronto, July 8.—His head crushed between the elevator floor and a hoist, Leo Coley, a 15 year old boy, employed as messenger for Northrop Liman, was fatally injured this morning.

How the accident happened nobody knows. The firm's shipper found the boy caught between the elevator floor and a hoist and had him removed to St. Michael's Hospital, but he lived only a few minutes.

Sa'oonless Nation by July 1920.

Atlantic City, N. J., July 11.—"If President Taft succeeds in winning his campaign for universal peace, he will win with it a place among the foremost statesmen of the world. It was during his term of office that the crowning glory of his achievements," declared former Vice-President C. W. Fairbanks, before the Christian Endeavorers to-night.

Among the several resolutions introduced in the convention to-night and adopted, was one which provides for a country-wide anti-saloon campaign, the slogan of which will be "a saloonless nation by the first of July, 1920."

The convention this afternoon secured pledges of \$10,000 of the \$25,000 fund they expect to raise before the close of the meetings here to add to a fund of \$175,000 already secured for the international headquarters building at Boston.

Feet Fast in Mud Boy is Drowned.

New York, July 9.—While bathing in Newton Creek at the foot of Ten Eyck Street, Williamsburg, yesterday, Gottlieb Helper, eighteen years old, of No. 120 Knickerbocker Ave., was drowned when his feet became stuck in the mud. Helper leaped from the end of the pier. His feet became fastened in the mud and he was unable to free himself. His companions tried to reach him but failed, and shouted to persons on the pier.

In response to the call, Charles Miller, thirteen years old, of No. 133 Thames Street, jumped into the water, and, after a hard struggle, brought Helper to the surface. Helper was apparently unconscious and with the aid of Miller was dragged from the water to the pier. Vain efforts were made to revive the youth.

LIVERPOOL, July 16.

A number of the steamship companies involved in the recent strike, has decided to advance passenger rates to Canada and the United States from \$1.25 to \$2.50, in order to offset the increase of wages which they were obliged to grant to their strikers. It is possible that there will also be some increase in freight rates.

Reciprocity.

A great deal of discussion has taken place lately in the daily press on the subject of Reciprocal trade between Newfoundland and the United States, more especially in its connection with the Reciprocity arrangement made between the President of the United States and the Government of Canada, which is now before the United States Senate and the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada. To our mind it will make but little difference to Newfoundland whether we get reciprocity or not, or whether Canada gets it or not. We must assume that Newfoundland is as able as, if not able, than, any other fishing country to compete in the fish markets of the world. We boast of our splendid advantages as a cod fishing country, of our splendid advantages as a cod fishing country, of our exhausted banks so convenient of access and our unequalled bait supply, and it would fill fit in with our wide claim if we are not able to catch and cure fish, and cure it too in any way that the market may demand, cheaper than any other country. That being assumed, let us consider for a moment what, from the economic standpoint, ought to be the effect of a free entry of Canadian (or Nova Scotian) fish into the United States whilst ours was excluded by a tariff wall. It is obvious that for some years by the very law of inertia very little difference in supply or demand would result; prices would be enhanced, not necessarily to the full extent of the duty of 34 cents per cwt., but whatever advantage would accrue to Nova Scotia would proportionately attach to that part of her export which she now obtains from Newfoundland. Competition would force up the value of all suitable fish in Nova Scotia, and the enhanced price would extend to the purchases from this Colony. Nova Scotia buys in round numbers 100,000 qtls. of fish from Newfoundland, and a large portion of this is exported to United States markets including Porto Rico. It cannot be assumed that Nova Scotia's access to the States markets will give her any preponderant advantage in conducting her fisheries and it is therefore manifest that to meet the demands of her markets she cannot and will not lessen her reliance on Newfoundland. So that in the case we are supposing, that is of free entry of fish from Canada into the United States market, with a tariff in the United States against Newfoundland, Newfoundland cannot be injured but on the contrary advantage to a certain extent.

Matched to Fight.

Los Angeles, Calif., July 11.—Ad Wolgast, lightweight champion of the world, and Freddie Welsh, challenger, will meet in a 20-round fight for the title here on Thanksgiving Day. The terms accepted by the fighters from promoter T. J. McCarney call for an unpublished amount for Wolgast, said to be \$35,000, and \$5,000 for Welsh. In addition, Wolgast will get 51 per cent of the receipts from moving pictures, and Welsh 49. There will be no side bet. The weight will be 132 pounds at ringside. The fight will be refereed by either Jack Welsh or Eddie Smith.

Real Tragedy Recorded on Film

New York, July 12.—A real tragedy was recorded on the film of a moving picture machine here late yesterday. As Albert Breyer, actor and expert swimmer and diver leaped from a boat on Staten Island Pond, the machine was set in operation to record his aquatic feat, its lens focused on the bubbling surface of the Pond where he had disappeared. The moments passed and the widening circles from the impact of his dive touched the shores. The diver's last feat had been caught on the film. He did not reappear and is supposed to have been held fast by the soft mud at the bottom. His body was grasped for and recovered.

State Dinner.

Dublin, July 10.—The King gave a state banquet at Dublin Castle to-night. The royal party was specially brought from London for the occasion. The guests included the Lord Mayor of Dublin.

Afterward the King held a chapter of the Order of St. Patrick, at which the Earl of Shaftesbury and Field Marshal Lord Kitchener were invested as extra knights companions.
