There had been nothing wrong in the impulse. Why shouldn't she have yielded to it, why have been proud of not yielding?

There is such a thing as being too impulsive, and there is such a thing as not being impulsive, and most old people aren't impulsive enough.

One Can Conquer One's Impulses Too Easily.

When you find yourself conquering your impulses too easily, look out. It means you are growing wiser perhaps, but also it too often means that you are "not so young as you have been."

Not long ago, as I was on my way to town on the trolley, we were held up by the fire apparatus. The fire was on a side street. We could see smoke and flame, chimneys sprang out, the air was electric with the excitement that a fire always produces. I was going into town for some shopping that did not need to be done that day. The impulse came to me to get off the car and go to see that fire. I stood up, and then the inhibitions got in their work. I might hurt my white shoes, I had planned to do that shopping to-day, I'd have to pay another fare, the fire would probably be out in a few minutes. And I sat down

again, stayed on the car, like a respectable citizen, and did my shopping like a humdrum, plan-shackled person.

It meant I was growing old. When it was too late to get off. I was disgusted with myself, for I knew that it meant I was growing old.

Next time I have an impulse, I'm going to yield to it, just to prove to myself that the part of me which makes that possible hasn't altogether perished.

When I talk of yielding to impulses, I don't mean harmful ones, of course, nor income ones like shrieking out in a crowded place when you are nervous, or telling the disagreeable person beside you that there is something about him you don't like, and you think it's his face.

To Say Something Direct From The Heart.

I mean harmless little impulses to do something you hadn't planned to do, to go somewhere unexpectedly, to say something direct from the heart.

The definition of impulse is "a mental force which simply and directly urges to action."

I think many of us would be happier if we didn't place so many restrictions on the simplicity and directness of our natures.
