#### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

**MINERS TRAPPED.**  
**PERU, Ill., June 10.**  
More than a hundred miners are  
trapped in a mine on St. Paul Rail-  
road at Mark, ten miles south of here,  
by fire, which broke out shortly af-  
ter noon. A rescue crew, equipped with  
helmet, is attempting to reach the  
level where the majority of the men  
are believed to be caught.

**TERRORISM INTENSIFIED.**  
**DUBLIN, June 10.**  
College authorities have cancelled  
the annual Athletic Festival Week of  
Trinity College, in consequence of the  
receipt of a letter, purporting to be  
from the Irish Republican Army,  
warning them that sports could only  
be held at risk to the public.

**OUTSPOKEN SIMS.**  
**LONDON, June 10.**  
Rear Admiral William S. Sims made  
a direct mention of U.S. residents be-  
ing in sympathy with the Irish Re-  
publican cause to-day, during a forty  
minute address at a luncheon, given  
in his honor by the U.S. Luncheon  
Club. In an apparent allusion, how-  
ever, to his remarks of last Tuesday,  
when he addressed the English Speak-  
ing Union, Admiral Sims said: "Perhaps  
we have used too energetic adjectives  
on some occasions, but let us hope that  
will be amply explained away."  
The Admiral paused a moment, and  
then said, "But I am going on doing  
the same things."

**SEMOENOFF HAS TROUBLE**  
**Vladivostok, June 10.**  
Difficulties are being experienced by  
General Semoenoff, anti-Bolshevik  
Leader, and the anti-Bolshevik el-  
ement, which recently took over the  
Government of Vladivostok, and are  
reaching an acute stage. The new Gov-  
ernment issued a statement to-day re-  
pudiating Semoenoff's claim to any of-  
ficial position, and also denied that  
Semoenoff was the anti-Bolshevik Com-  
mander-in-Chief.

#### Highlanders Defeated.

**"KILTIES" OUTPLAYED BY B.I.S.**  
By 7 goals to 0 the B.I.S. defeated  
the Highlanders in last night's foot-  
ball, before a very large number of  
spectators. From start to finish the  
Highlanders were completely outplay-  
ed by the B.I.S., who simply made  
rings around them, displaying the best  
combination seen on the field this  
year. Every man on the B.I.S. team  
knew his place and always contrived  
to be there when the ball came his  
way, and, moreover, knew when to  
get rid of it and how. They showed  
without a doubt that their many prac-  
tices had done them a great deal of  
good. In spite of the fact that they  
had the wind and sun against them,  
the B.I.S. forced things from the start  
and kept the ball in their opponent's  
territory for the best part of the half.  
Within five minutes of the commence-  
ment of the game, Callahan dribbled  
up field on his own and passed to F.  
Phelan, who scored. Some few min-  
utes later Phelan took the ball up the  
right wing and put in a nice centre to  
Callahan, who again found the net.  
There was no further scoring during  
the half, but the Irish had by far the  
best part of the game.

#### SECOND HALF.

From the start of the second half  
the B.I.S. rushed the play into their  
opponent's territory and the game de-  
teriorated into a "shoot for goal," the  
only thing to interest the spectators  
being the fine combination shown by  
the Irish. Eight minutes after the  
start of the half, Callahan scored from  
a rebound, and three minutes later  
Evans added another goal to the three  
already obtained. The Highlanders  
now tried hard to get the ball clear of  
their own goal, but the B.I.S. were too  
much for them. Thirteen minutes after  
the start of the half, Phelan put in a  
splendid shot from the right wing,  
which entered the goal. Before the  
final whistle sounded, E. Phelan and  
Burke accounted for a goal each. The  
form shown by the B.I.S. proves them  
a team to be reckoned with during the  
season. Each team has now played  
one game.

#### Democracy Again.

Dear Sir,—The term "democracy"  
as conceived and defined by Mr.  
Smallwood like unto charity or  
patriotism in so much as it covers a mul-  
titude of sins. According to the best  
authorities on Political Science (in-  
cluding Aristotle, among the ancients,  
and Blundschill, Sidgwick, Hobbes,  
and John Stuart Mill among the mod-  
erns) the term is only properly ap-  
plied to a form of Government, and  
Government, consequently the phrase  
"political democracy" is tautologous,  
and the other two alleged species, al-  
located to by Mr. Smallwood, have in  
reality no existence at all.

Real or direct democracy does not  
belong to the realms of imagination  
and political speculation, neither is it  
altogether a matter of ancient history.  
It obtains to-day in some of the Can-  
tons of Switzerland, and if it were re-  
levant to the question at issue, one  
might throw some interesting light  
upon its working.

Delegated or indirect democracy is  
however no more a matter of imagina-  
tion, and is a system of Government  
of the moment concerned; this system of  
Government is based on majority rule,  
upon the fact that before the law all  
men are equal, and the many must be  
better than the few.

In an indirect or delegated democ-  
racy two distances separate the people  
from the laws made:

- (a) The laws are not made by the  
people themselves but by repre-  
sentatives.
- (b) The representatives (in most  
cases as messengers) but on their own  
initiative; they are in fact legislators,  
and even if they break their pledges to  
the people, their legislation is  
still valid in law.

Even among the early Grecian  
democracies which were direct, and  
where it was the duty of everyone to  
legislate, only the men were legisla-  
tors. I am unaware of any democracy  
in ancient times where women had a  
voice, and no one can deny that these  
democracies boasted of rule of the  
people by the people. Theoretically  
speaking democracy is supposed to be  
Government of all by all; this in real-  
ity is never realised and generally  
works out to be Government of all,  
by the few. This due to the fact that  
in all cases the people are liable to be  
led by a few demagogues and to vote  
for the good of a section of the people  
and not for the good of all. As Aris-  
totle says: "The demagogue is to the  
people what the flatterer is to the  
tyrant."

Moreover the principle of equality  
may be misapplied and misdirected,  
because men as men are equal, but not  
equal as individuals. The general pol-  
icy of a nation will, consequently,  
sometimes depend upon the caprice of  
passions, and the sense of personal  
responsibility is bound to be dulled  
and lowered. For these reasons I am  
not at all a blind believer in democ-  
racy and Mr. Smallwood takes too  
much for granted when he says I am.  
Mr. Smallwood classes the system of  
Government of Newfoundland as an  
indirect or delegated democracy;  
however, I do not see how it can be  
delegated, in my respect, a poor imi-  
tation of the real article. Let us deal  
with it such as it is. The constitution  
of this country provides that the Gov-  
ernment is elected by the majority of the  
people, and so far in Newfoundland the  
people (politically speaking) are the men.  
The authority of the Government there-  
fore originates in this country in the  
men of this country. In so much as the  
system of Government is democratic  
(it strictly speaking it can be placed  
in any one of the usual categories)  
changes in the constitution must be  
made only at the desire of the people,  
and through them; and here again the  
people mean the men who according  
to the constitution are entitled to vote.  
There are only two ways (consan-  
ant with the theories of democracy)  
by which changes in the constitution  
can be brought about. The first is by  
the legislation of a government elected  
for the express purpose of effecting  
such change; the second is by the  
legislation of a government elected
