Royal Wedding Gifts.
PRINCESS MARY RECEIVED A VARIETY.

LONDON (Associated Press).—The vast number and varied assortment of wedding presents to Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles displayed here caused many people to wonder what the newly-weds would do with the 66 jugs and bowls, 16 silver toast-racks and 22 clocks included in the offerings. The late King Edward, after his marriage, found himself the possessor of 1,500 teapots of all types and descriptions and of more than 800 cruets. It is reported that some of these are still stored in London. Only persons who had been presented at court or who could claim personal acquaintance with either Princess Mary or her husband were permitted to tender wedding gifts on the occasion of the recent royal wedding. Charitable and other public organizations and institutions were, of course, excepted. This ruling perhaps saved Princess Mary the embarrassment over disposing of teapots and cruets suffered by King Edward.

A VARIED ASSORTMENT.
A classification of the gifts exhibited at St. James' palace shows only 28 tea services were presented. Other items are 155 articles of jewelry, including bracelets, necklaces, pendants, tiaras, brooches, rings, caskets, fans and watches; a trayful of flawless, unset, precious stones; 893 gifts made from precious metals, including 29 trays, 24 vases, 31 cups, 12 goblets, 18 inkstands, 25 statuettes, 14 card trays, nine cigarette cases, eight travelling cases, and seven workboxes; 197 books and manuscripts, 22 candleabra, 17 umbrellas, 14 lamps and shades, 17 rugs, 22 sets of cutlery, eight wall brackets, 36 dinner services, 47 breakfast table services, 18 silver salvers, 70 pairs of gloves, 10 wedding cakes and seven hunting crops. While correspondents invited to a private view were being shown about the state rooms where the presents were on display, the 22 gift clocks all began the chiming of 6 o'clock at almost the same instant—and the newspaper party was ushered out as it had been invited to call "between 5 and 6 p.m."

Magic Beans.

The Soya bean is undoubtedly the world's most wonderful plant. It grows with extraordinary rapidity, taking only one hundred days to mature from seed to plant and seed again, and is of a bright scarlet color, which afterwards fades to green. It

needs very little attention, will yield as much as one hundred bushels to the acre, and improves the land on which it grows. The beans can be made into flour, salad-dressing, lubricating and illuminating oil, glycerine, paint, varnish, celluloid, printing ink, soap, waterproofs, explosives, linoleum, and substitutes for milk,

rubber coffee, and margarine! The inhabitants of the East have used this magic bean for thousands of years, but it has only been introduced recently into Europe. In 1914 J. L. North, of the Royal Botanic Society, England, obtained thirteen tiny seeds, and every year he has grown the bean, selecting the seeds most likely to

stand the British climate. Now 60,000 seeds, and this year to be sown over two acres in four districts. The plant is hardy, but it needs sunshine. North hopes in time to produce that will be able to do without shine, and then the Soya bean will be grown in large quantities.
