General Election For Great Britain.

British Constitution Assured Ratification --
Great Crowds at Leeds Welcomed Lloyd
George -- International Fishing Schooner
Race Being Sailed To-day.

MAYFLOWER GROUNDS

GLoucester, Oct. 20.
The Boston schooner Mayflower ran
round in Gloucester Harbor this af-
ternoon. She struck a mud covered
wharf. It is expected she will float
high tide without injury. The
schooner, Canada's defender, also pok-
ed her nose in the mud at the wharf,
but sustained no damage. An un-
usually low tide was responsible.

GENERAL ELECTION SURE.

LONDON, Oct. 20.
The still highly speculative situ-

ation tonight only two facts stood out
as definite--there will be almost an
immediate general election and Par-
liamentary ratification of the Irish
Constitution is assured. Andrew Bon-
ar Law in a message to the evening
newspapers confirmed his intention to
advise the King to immediately dis-
solve Parliament and added that this
fact would give ample time to deal
with the Irish Legislation. He did
not intimate whether the present Par-
liament would reassemble, according
to schedule, on November 14, to deal
with the Irish Legislation or whether
it would be left to the new Parlia-

ment. From assurances given by vari-
ous leaders, no party in the House
is likely to offer any hindrance to car-
rying the Irish Treaty into effect.
Lloyd George is credited with inten-
tions to create a centre party. This
would necessitate the creation also
of a new party machinery and party
funds, for the former Premier has no
such funds or machinery at his dis-
posal. One of the weekly political re-
views declare the election will turn
upon the simple question of for or
against Lloyd George and will be
purely a personal contest. There is
no great question now before the
country, and from slight indications
afforded, the ex-Premier, who is in
great fighting mood, seems to turn
the whole contest on the personal
equation.

LLOYD GEORGE'S WELCOME.

LEEDS, Oct. 20.
Great crowds welcomed David Lloyd
George and party on arrival here by
special train tonight. He delivered
five minute addresses at various sta-
tions on the way from London and
elsewhere and was greeted warmly.
"I invite your support in the battle
for national interests," Lloyd George
told his audience at Kettering. At
Leicester: "You probably have heard
they don't like me at the Carlton Club.
That seems to have added a number
of friends not only at Leicester, but
all along the route. I have never wit-
nessed such remarkable demonstra-
tions. We were pulling together and
now the Carlton Club orders party
first. No wonder some of the oldest,
ablest and most experienced speak-
ers of the Conservative Party protes-
ted against the orders and declined
to carry them out." The Liberal As-
sociation at Nottingham presented
Lloyd George with an address to
which he replied that he was standing
for national unity. At Sheffield he told
the crowd that the Carlton Club
wrecked the organization which won
the war.

PREPARING THE FORD.

GLoucester, Oct. 20.
Sailmakers aboard the Henry Ford,
the American challenger for the In-
ternational Fishermen's trophy held
by the Canadian schooner Bluenose,
were working overtime tonight, top-
ping off four hundred and thirty-eight
square feet of the vessel's sail area
in an endeavor to have her in readiness
for the opening tomorrow, of the In-
ternational series. The work is be-
ing done at the direction of the In-
ternational Committee, headed by W.
W. Luffkin, Collector of the port of Bos-
ton, which, acting upon the report of
the American Race Committee, ruled
that the Challenger's canvas exceeded
by so much the area allowed under the

rules. Three members of the Ford's
crew have been eliminated as not bona
fide fishermen.

REPORT OF CHIEF AGENT S.F.A.,
WEEK ENDING OCTOBER
20, 1922.

Examined a number of outport pon-
ies and spoke to the owners about hav-
ing pithchards on their carts. Was
called to humanely destroy two dogs
and two horses, one horse having
picked up a nail the other suffering
from a swollen hind leg, which was
incurable. Checked a man on Sunday
night for over-driving. He promised
that it would not happen again. At-
tended to the landing of 20 head cattle
from the "Sable I", one being very
wild the owner had it taken away on
a cart; attended also to the landing
of a carload of cattle at the Reid Co's
station; and 115 head cattle, 60 sheep,
11 horses, and a lot of pigs from the
"Canadian Snapper." All carefully
landed and taken away. Received re-
port of several horses having been
killed along the railway line, made en-
quiries at the company's office, who
said that these cattle were not left to
suffer, the law concerning the same
being carried out. Attended two sales
of cattle and saw that the cattle were
taken away alright. My attention has
been called to horses finding it hard to
get along LeMarchant Road, about
ten accidents having happened during
the past week. Mr. Simmons had his
wagon damaged and horse injured. A
west end grocer broke the shafts of
his express, and several coal carts
had their shafts broken. It would be

with sand. Several complaints have
been received of lame horses. I am do-

Unusual Accident.

TRUCK BOWLED OVER BY STREET
CAR.

Yesterday afternoon, near Rawlin's
Cross, a motor truck, owned by Mr.
Easterbrook of Pouch Cove, and load-
ed with about twenty quintals of fish
was bowled over by a street car, and
somewhat wrecked. Three occupants,
Miss Newell, Herbert Moulton, and
Kenneth Hudson, went over with the
machine and had a narrow escape
from being killed. The truck, which
was being driven by Hudson had pass-
ed the Cross and was turning into
Queen's Road, when the street car
coming East appeared. Hudson was
crossing the track to proceed on the
left side, but the rear of the truck did
not clear. The motorman of the
street car applied the brakes to pre-
vent a collision, but failed to bring
his car up and the truck was thrown
over on its side, bringing up against
a telephone pole. It was at first
thought that the occupants were badly
injured but after a few minutes they
managed to crawl out of the wreckage
none the worse for their experience.
The rear wheel of the truck was smash-
ed to splinters and some minor dam-
age done to the top woodwork.
