Twenty-five Million Poppies

Poppy Day will be held by the British Legion on November 10. Its aim is to alleviate distress in ex-Service homes and at the same time to keep alive the spirit of comradeship. Twenty-five million Poppies have been made, the bulk of them at the Legion's Factory in the Old Kent Road, where eighty disabled men are kept employed the whole year round. The Poppies will be sold in all parts of the Empire at minimum prices of threepence, sixpence, and a shilling. Eighty ocean liners are co-operating in the movement. In London there will be sellers in the streets, hotels, clubs, and stores. It is hoped, too, that the collections in the churches and chapels, on Armistice Day, will be given to the fund. Temporary Poppy Day Headquarters have been established at 34 Lowndes Square, S.W.

Three Men in a Boat

ADVENTUROUS VOYAGE OF 14,000 MILES.

With a crew of three, a tiny craft called The Shanghai, of 27 tons, has left Cape Town on a 6,000 miles voyage to Europe. This is merely a part of an adventurous voyage of 14,000 miles which the trio set themselves to write a special correspondent from Johannesburg.

At the beginning of this year six Danish officers of the Great Northern Telegraph Company in Shanghai had concluded their contracts and were due for leave. The ordinary steamers were available, but the men preferred to buy this small craft and to spice their voyage home to Copenhagen with a little adventure.

The Shanghai is only 47 feet long, with a beam of 18 feet and a draught of 7 1/2 feet. When she reached Durban her crew declined to have her towed in, and, under the power of her little 10-h.p. engine, she made her own berth at the wharf. The six men aboard her made light of the 3,000 miles of their journey which they had then accomplished.

First a Revolver at the Steersman. Scarcely out of Shanghai, on February 7, they were forced by bad weather to leave to, and while in this position a Chinese junk with a large crew came out from the island and made as if to board the little craft. The helmsman of the junk fired a revolver at the steersman of the ketch, but missed, and the appearance of the rest of the Shanghai's crew, armed with shotguns, was enough to persuade the "private" that business was meant. The junk drifted away.

At Batavia three of the six decided that they had had enough adventure and left to return by ordinary steamer. There were thus only three left—Høngebund, Ingwersen, and Vauman—and they continued the voyage. Between Mauritius and Durban the weather they encountered was so bad that they made only 20 miles in nine hours. Their 3,000 miles to Durban took a little over six months.

Mount Cachel Band at the Majestic

Harold Lloyd's 7-Act Comedy Coming

LLOYD GETS IDEA IN A FLASH FOR NEW COMEDY.

Ideas for comedies are rare. For the type of feature comedies that Harold Lloyd makes, they are "rarer than rare."

The happy thought that led to the making of the spectacular comedian's latest and longest feature, "Safety Last," a seven-reel Pathe comedy, came like a flash out of a sky.
