The Practical Accomplishment of the Monroe Party

The splendid rally of the voters of the country last spring to the support of the Monroe Party was due to the exposure of the conditions existing in the Public Service and of the mismanagement of the late Administration during their years of office. The turnover was a complete vindication of the strength and purity of public opinion, and showed in an unmistakable manner that it could still be relied upon in spite of the efforts made to undermine the morals of the people.

The Monroe Party pledged themselves to clean up and keep clean, and to do their utmost to restore the financial stability of the country. They were prepared for a serious task, but the magnitude of the undertaking to which they found themselves committed was only discovered after they had taken office. Not yet five months in power, they have applied themselves vigorously to the country's most pressing needs, to reorganizing those departments in which system had been allowed to fall into disrepute and service had become a matter of secondary importance. Many leakages have been stopped and effective methods to collect the revenue have been adopted.

The claim is not made that the work is completed; it has only begun, but already the results have been shown in the practical form of cold cash. The Opposition press has referred with contempt to the increase in the revenue of nearly a quarter of a million dollars in four months, but then, does the history of the last few years indicate that the Opposition ever held any other opinion than that of contempt for the country's millions?

A great increase in the revenue has been obtained, and at the same time taxation has been reduced. Is this not an accomplishment to be proud of? That increased revenue has not been taken out of the fishermen's pocket, but has been secured by the vigorous application of the Customs Act without fear or favour. The taxes removed were those which had pressed most heavily on the producer, and the decision of the Government in this matter testifies to the wisdom of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and the concern that he has for the comfort of those who go down to the sea in ships. The Opposition claim that they were the first to remove these duties. We willingly admit it, and give them credit for so doing, but they themselves afterwards confessed that they had acted without authority and consequently their action can only be regarded as a bluff.

In the matter of Government printing, there was formerly little or no regard for the expenditure incurred, and now that a businesslike system has been introduced, there is a howl from the Opposition press. Surely if there was an iota of truth in the charge made that the papers favourable to the Government were in receipt of rich patronage, the outcry at being thus de-

prived should first come from them. Our support is not a matter of dollars and cents, but is based on the belief that the Party is carrying out a sound policy to the best of its ability, and because that policy is consistent with the principles which the Telegram has unflinchingly upheld, and which has made its name esteemed and respected throughout the Island.

Promenade Band Concert

The Promenade Band Concert, held by Mount Cashel in the Gaiety Hall, last night, was largely attended and proved very enjoyable. Owing to the stores being open the programme of twelve selections did not commence until nine o'clock. A large number of these working late in the stores availed of the opportunity. Military Crosses Arrive

By the fast Digby there arrived from England a shipment of stone and four Crosses of Sacrifice from the Imperial War Graves Commission, to be erected in the military plots of the city cemeteries. They are the same as those already erected in the British Cemeteries in France and Belgium, and will serve as fitting memorials to the gallant men who sacrificed their lives for King and Country.

Earl of Devon Arrives

S.S. Earl of Devon, Capt. A. Carter, arrived yesterday from points on the date, and later sold by auction to Messrs. Labradors. The ship, it will be remembered, went north to bring home the balance of the fishing crews, and on Monday last became temporarily disabled when her propeller came in contact with a rock while going through Assizes Harbor Run, knocking off two of the blades. Upwards of 100 fishermen, who were on board at the time, were transferred to the Sagona, which took them to Humbermouth. The Earl of Devon then proceeded to this port, stopping at Seaside Come By while en route. Upon arrival she moored at the Dry Dock wharf and will be placed on the slips to-day for repairs.

Kirsten Jensen Coming

The steamer Kirsten Jensen, which was badly damaged by fire at Silver-ers, A. H. Murray & Co., will arrive here shortly. Capt. Randall is now at Silver-ers sitting her up for the run. The Price of Fish Goes up as Coaker Goes Down

Oh, fickle, weak-minded, inconsistent man. Oh, poor, childish, trusting men of Newfoundland! How greatly the man has fallen down on his job! How harshly he has demonstrated his bungling incapacity! At last, the people of the whole island, of our cities, of our townships and our settlements have awakened to the urgent necessity of immediately looking elsewhere for aid, for establishing an organization of public improvement and national salvation. Just so surely as the leading men in our community have realized the duty that the country has expected of them, so also have our people, every true hearted man that our country can boast of, united themselves with determination and enthusiasm to compel a people's Government that will recall us from the racial decay that is fast wiping out our manhood. Just so surely as the results of W. F. Coaker's halfhearted schemes stand around the coast in the form of dead centers which were formerly thriving business firms, so also will the party that has risen over the head of the Coaker administration once more stimulate our fishing industries, reclaim our markets, and cause our selling prices to soar high again. The saying "Fish will go up as fast as Coaker goes down."

Supreme Court

In the matter of the application of Howley, K.C., acting on behalf of Sir Richard Scudamore, an order nisi against the Evening Telegram and Morning News to show cause why they should not be committed for contempt of Court in reference to articles dealing with Grand Jurors, was granted. The order nisi was returnable on Wednesday at 11 o'clock.

The matter of the King vs. Russell was dealt with by the full bench this morning. In the case of Donald Bartlett, bailiff, cross-examined, said that on the 13th inst., he went to the address, 22 Cabot Street, and found the house barred up. He made enquiries and learned that it had been closed for months and that the owner was at Deer Lake. He reported to the Sheriff, and was told to leave the summons on the premises. He visited the place on the 14th inst., and poked the door open from the storm-door. Yesterday he again went to the place, and left a summons to appear to-day and show cause why he should not be fined \$200 for non attendance.

Mr. Cross deposed to going through the same procedure in the case of another juror, Joseph F. Clarke, 8 Bailey Street. He is at present in Halifax on the way to New York.

In the case of the non appearance of Frederick Bastow, his brother, Norman deposed that he has been for some time in Saskatchewan. His former residence was on Pennywell Road, about 3 miles from the city. The bailiff had to make three trips to the place serving the summonses.

Other absentees jurors were:—J. F. Lynch, formerly of Cochrane St., but now resident in Italy; J. H. Glass, formerly Circular Road, now in Halifax; James H. Jardine, at present in White Bay; Edgar Cornick, formerly 12 Atlantic Avenue, sold out his premises and is at present residing in Boston and George Tessler, now residing in Fermanagh. The same process was followed by the bailiffs in the case of all the absentees.

The Court rose at 11.30 a.m. to sit again at 11 a.m. on Monday.
