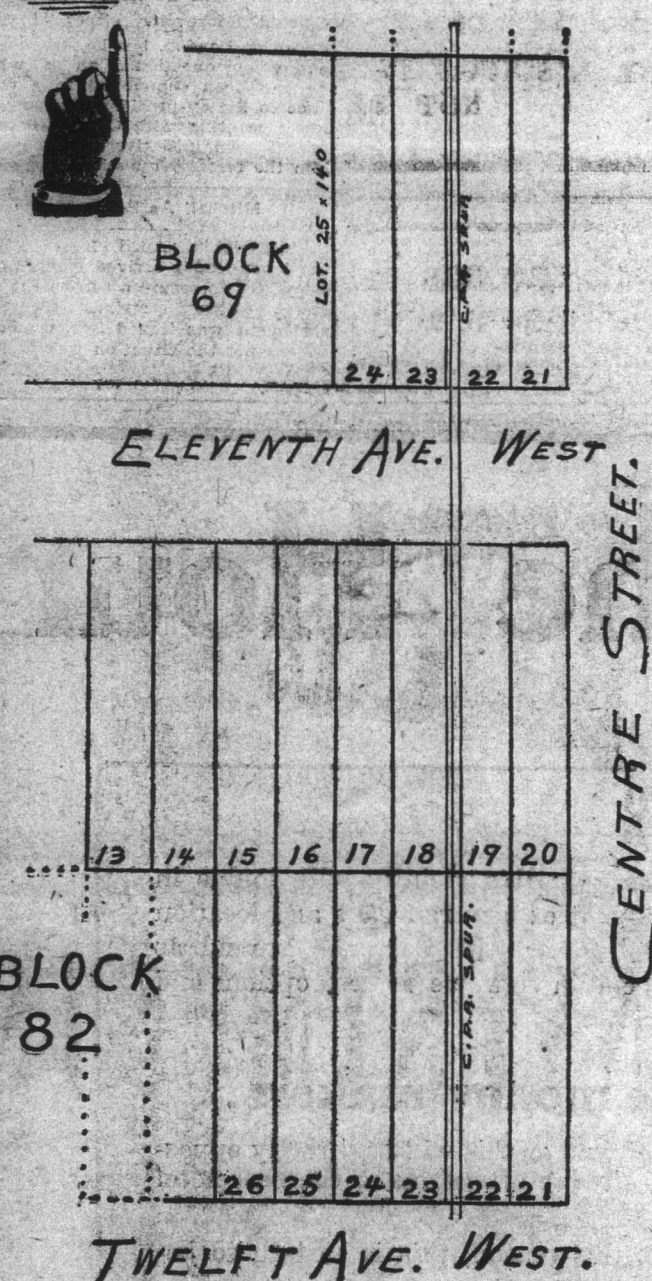

Wage-Workers' Symposium

The Philadelphia Strike
The strike of the street car men in the "City of Brotherly Love" has furnished material for discussion among the membership of organized labor throughout the country. From the very moment the street car men of Philadelphia protested against the machinations of the company to crush their union and wipe it out of existence, the administration of the city and state arrayed itself with the corporation to uphold and defend the brutal despotism of the "faction" magnates. The mayor of the city of Philadelphia became the outspoken champion of corporate greed and declared that "there was nothing to arbitrate." The police force, the fire department and the city employees were converted into an army, equipped with the weapons of murder, to suppress the strikers at all hazards. The state constabulary was called in and these "Gestapo" Cossacks felt no scruples in even committing violence on women and children, as they galloped madly wherever people assembled on the streets. The officers of the traction company have dominated the administration of the city of Philadelphia, and every order from the street car magnates has been faithfully executed by the constabulary. The Philadelphia strike is a world-wide movement of labor men in Pennsylvania's largest city. The brutality imposed on the strikers of Philadelphia is awakening the membership of organized labor throughout America to the fact that there is no "identity of interest" between employer and exploited, and that the man of economic power can use every force, masked by law, to subjugate the laboring people. —Miners' Magazine.

A. F. of L. at Philadelphia
The Philadelphia revolt on the part of the A. F. of L. members corroborates the contention that wage-workers will do the right thing when they have to. When it comes to a show-down President Gompers could not dictate to the organization. The organization is, after all, the real machine. This is contrary to the view of many "industrialists," but it reaffirms the position taken by the majority of socialist-unionists that the A. F. of L. is and should be made the economic instrument of the wage-workers of this continent. The present trend of events in hitherto isolated workers' organizations is further evidence in favor of such action. With the Western Federation of Miners and the railway brotherhoods lining up for affiliation, and the present practical move towards federation—departments—the future of the American Federation of Labor may write more of the history of labor's emancipation than the most enthusiastic have hitherto anticipated. In the world-wide movement of labor men are mighty small potatoes. Economic forces are compelling the workers to take the correct line of action. From the policy of "no politics" to the consideration of the formation of an independent political party, in four short years, is worthy of note and full of significance. The phenomenal increase in membership in what is termed the organized labor movement is a hopeful sign. Once the workers become interested in their own welfare, once they realize their slavish and helpless position under capitalism, and finally when they see in working class political action the key to a solution of the problem, the triumph of labor is not far distant. The next ten years will unfold the most eventful period in the entire struggle of the ancient world for freedom. It is a privilege to be fully alive these days. The culmination of evolution—a revolution in our social system—is to take place in our time. It will require a splendid exhibition of solidarity and much education to fit the workers for the responsibilities of administering the affairs of the new social order. Until the smoke and din of the struggle for supremacy has cleared away, few of us will realize the part we have been playing in the role of the greatest event in the world's history.

No use of prating your rights, if you have not the power to enforce them. Governments are but executive committees of the employing-owning-class. The workers waste a lot of money celebrating the liberties they do not possess. Every parliament building under the flag of capitalism should be converted into a Labor Temple. Legislators invariably represent and remain true to the interests responsible for their election. German printers of New York have made a demand for \$22 and \$25 a week for seven and seven and one-half hours' work per day.

J. W. Bonnet is the new editor of the District Leader, Fernie, official organ of District 18 of the United Mine Workers of America. An amendment to reduce the property qualification of Toronto municipal office-seekers to \$200 has been defeated in the legislature. The Label League of Spokane is a live and energetic one. It is arousing action in various places among the 6,000 members of the unions. Calgary street-sweepers receive \$15.00 for a nine-hour-day. Recently the Trades and Labor Council of the Alberta metropolis, is liberating. T. Wrench, 1943 Charles street, is the secretary of a new Vancouver Union Local No. 40, of the Amalgamated Glass Workers' International association.

The organization of all the mine workers of America on industrial lines will be sure to lead to the creation of other great industrial unions—New York Call. There are 76,642 women and girls employed on this continent in the telephone offices. Most of them receive less than six dollars a week. Few of them receive more. Lethbridge, Alta., Trades and Labor Council has unanimously protested against the action of Canada's postmaster general in discriminating against Cotton's Weekly in the matter of postage rates. New times demand new measures and now new men! The world advances, and in time out-grows. The laws that in our fathers' day were best—Howell. Says P. Obermeyer in the Hamilton Herald: "Last week a caller presented himself at the home of P. M. Draper, Ottawa, secretary of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, whom the family did not have heart to turn away—it's a girl. The employers today are just as averse to their slaves being freed from their domination as were the chattel slave owners. And for the same reason—that the slaves are profitable. It is the profit of wage-slaves that causes it to be defended by the employers. Do you like to make the other man's living and your own also? Do you like to keep others up in luxury while you live always at the door of poverty? Call yourselves men and suffer such a condition and ignorantly vote for it at every election? Wake up—Appeal. Says Albert Hubbard: "Buckley's whole volume is a protest against the way in which history has been written—a protest against the assumption that military history, a history of marches and counter-marches, of skirmishes and sieges and slaughters, is history at all. International president, George L. Berry, of the Teamsters and Assistants, has notified subordinate unions that an assessment of one day's pay will be levied between the 22 and 23 of next May to be devoted towards the building of a home for tuberculosis patients and aged members. The Canadian Pacific Railway announces that on April 4, they will commence accepting freight in eastern Canada for shipment westbound via the lake and rail route, and will run all their five steamers. First steamed will leave as soon as navigation opens, which it is expected will this year be much earlier than usual. "The leading categories of labor who ventured to show their lack of solidarity in the great Philadelphia war between labor and capital were the composers and waiters. History repeats itself. Also at the Paris Commune and two trades distinguish themselves by their conduct—the composers and waiters.—New York Volkszeitung. The point that I desire to impress on my readers is, that all wealth is produced by applying human labor power to natural resources, and that there is no other way by which it is possible to produce anything that has an exchangeable value except by the simple process of working to produce it from the storehouse of nature. All the dealing in shares on the stock exchange of the world that has ever taken place, and all the banking transactions of the greatest of our financiers, has not added one penny's value to the wealth of the nation collectively, and further, I want you to remember that land of itself is valueless in an economic sense, and that it is only by application of labor to land that allows it to function as a factor in value, and this is the explanation of the sentence 'I have quoted from Sir William Petty, which says that labor is the father and active principle of wealth.—Val. Meentze, in March issue of Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners' Official Journal.
