Silk, manager of the Union Bank, Shelburne; Dr. H. E. Silk, Toronto; W. A. Silk, also of Toronto; Mrs. E. F. Gibson, Aylmer, and Mrs. (Dr.) R. W. Knowles, Petrola. His wife predeceased him about nine years ago.
