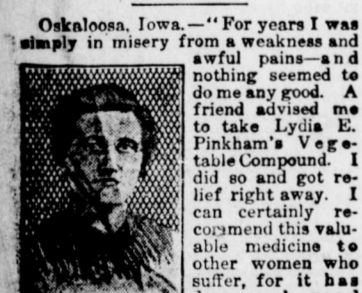

## AYLMER NEWSPAPER AMALGAMATION

From St. Thomas Times-Journal—Aylmer is the latest point to conform to the strong, almost compulsory, drift toward the single newspaper in districts where two daily or weekly journals cannot be supported under the pressure of war conditions. In Aylmer the natural disinclination,

experienced elsewhere, existed to merge the identities of two long established journals, each with its own distinctive characteristics and policies. But here also the public, particularly the advertising public, perceived that the position, in the circumstances had become impossible. Realizing the movement of opinion and that the current was too strong to be resisted, the publishers of the Aylmer Express and the East Elgin Tribune got together and after protracted discussion reached an agreement by which the Express bought out the Tribune as at October 1. Both papers have had a long and honorable history. The Express was established in 1874 as an independent newspaper and has been markedly successful in its field. The Market Elgin Tribune is the successor of the Aylmer Sun, established in 1886 also an independent newspaper, but of more

recent date with Liberal affiliations. In its latest form the Tribune has reflected the vigorous and aggressive personality of Mr. W. G. Charlton, recently a candidate for parliamentary honors in East Elgin. Only the strongest of reasons could have actuated him in consenting to the amalgamation. The Express will have to tackle the same problem that confronts the Times-Journal, the Border Cities Star and other journals that undertake to meet the wants of their mixed constituencies. The political public will at least expect better newspapers and impartial treatment and this no doubt will be satisfactorily met by the enterprising publishers of the Express.

## FIRE DESTROYS BARN AT BELMONT

The large modern barn on the farm of James McLellan, two miles north of Belmont, was completely demolished by fire Friday, which was started by a spark from an engine being used in filling a silo adjacent to the barn. Together with the building, 60 tons of hay, the entire season's crop, and two valuable horses were burned, and are a complete loss. The house, which was in imminent danger from the flames, was saved by the assistance of neighbors.
