A PRIZE FIGHT ENDS IN MURDER.

MONROVIA CITY, Pa., July 24.—There is great excitement here over a prize fight that turned into a murder.

John Myford, of Black Diamond, a mining town near here, quarreled several days ago about some trivial affair, though it is supposed jealousy over a girl was the real cause of the difficulty.

After the quarrel they were constantly bickering and it was decided that they should fight it out according to prize ring customs.

The two, accompanied by several friends, pitched a ring and stripped for a bare-knuckle fight.

The terrible rounds were fought, at the end of which both were bleeding profusely.

Both men came up for the fourth round, evidently meaning mischief.

A few preliminary blows were struck, when Boyd rushed in and delivered a tremendous blow on Myford's neck, just over the jugular.

Myford staggered back a few steps and fell to the ground insensible.

He never recovered consciousness, and expired an hour later.

Boyd surrendered himself.

John L. Sullivan's backers have deposited \$1,000 at New York to bind a match with Slavin.

AN ITALIAN TRAGEDY.

A WITTED CAVALRY MAN FIRED INTO THE WEDDING PARTY AND THEN KILLED HIMSELF.

ROME, July 24.—At Catanzaro, in Calabria, a cavalry officer named Scandazza fell in love with Virginia Guastiero, the daughter of a landowner whose mansion is opposite the barracks.

The acquaintance had existed two years, when the young lady's father ordered her to marry the son of a rich neighbor.

On the day of the wedding Scandazza stood at the window of the barracks, alternately menacing and imploring Virginia, by gestures, to disregard her father's injunctions.

Virginia's final reply was to press a lemon between her hands, a local way of indicating that all was over.

Scandazza rushed to his room, barricaded the door, and, as the wedding party was leaving the residence, he opened fire upon them.

The first shot struck and instantly killed Virginia's married sister.

A second bullet inflicted a severe wound in the head of the bride.

The procession dispersed in terror, and a crowd of infuriated citizens gathered before the barracks, clamoring for the officer's surrender.

Scandazza reopened fire, wounding several persons. The officers finally succeeded in forcing open his door, but Scandazza turned his weapon upon himself and blew his brains out.
