Montreal, July 24.—A tremendous crowd, not alone composed of the citizens of every class in Montreal, but augmented by thousands from every city, town and hamlet in the Province, long lines of streets as light as day thronged with eager thousands waiting for the pageant to pass, myriads of blazing torches, houses brilliantly illuminated from street to attic with colored lights, flags and bunting on every hand, rockets soaring skywards, the martial music of many bands, such were the distinguishing features of the reception tendered last night by the people to the Premier of Quebec.
