national Sunday School Convention yesterday the Statistical Secretary gave the following: Number of Sunday schools in the United States, 105,894; officers and teachers, 1,120,433; scholars, 8,598,891; total in Sunday schools, 9,719,284. In Canada, schools, 6,689; officers and teachers, 55,700; scholars, 528,329; total in Sunday school, 584,035. In Newfoundland and Labrador, schools, 314; officers and teachers, 2,162; scholars, 22,817; total in Sunday school, 24,979. The footings show schools, 112,897; officers and teachers, 8,1178,301; scholars, 9,149,997; total in Sunday schools, 10,328,298. Treasurer L. H. Bigler's report showed receipts of \$14,610 39 and expenditures of \$14,632 78 during the past year.

Train-Wreckers at Work.

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 26.—The most dastardly attempt at train-wrecking ever known in this part of the country occurred last night about 10:10, just before the Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwaukee westbound passenger was due. Two men were noticed by two small boys carrying a heavy timber to the railroad track, and before their purpose could be divined the train hove in sight around a curve and the men ran. The engine struck the end of the timber and was derailed, together with the baggage car, but the two passengers and parlor remained on the rails. Engineer Wm. Ritchie stuck to his post bravely, but could not stop for 30 rods. As he slowed up the tender tipped from the trucks and went over to the ground. Herbert Nesser, the fireman, was squeezed to a jelly and expired five minutes later. His home is in Detroit, where he has a wife but no children. He was 28 years old. There were 40 passengers on the train, and those in the rear coaches knew nothing of the matter until informed after the train stopped.
