LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mrs. and Miss Ella Haselgrove, Beecher

—Milton Bowman, of Chicago, formerly of
London, was killed the other day in a colli-
sion on the Rock Island Railway. He was
a young man in the employ of the Pullman
Car Company.

—Mr. Allan Stewart, of James Wilson &
Co., left last night for Vancouver, B.C.

He will stay over for a few days with a
brother in Qu'Appelle. Mr. Stewart in-
tends entering business with a brother
in Vancouver.

—In connection with the pleasing per-
formances of Harry Lindley's Company, at
Brantford during the past week, the Ex-
positor has this to say of a London musical
artist: "Mr. S. Clouston, the clarinet
player, has been a great addition to the
orchestra, and on Friday night he gave a
clarinet solo, and was heartily enjoyed."

—The attention of the Geological Survey
Department has been called to the fact that
several of the gas wells in the vicinity of
Port Colborne, which have been exhausted,
are now flowing oil. Thirteen of these
extinct gas wells have been acquired by one
company, who will develop them as oil
producers.

—Wm. Hops, a German tramp, who was
celebrating his how-to-by breaking into
the house of Isaac Saylor, on the Long-
wood road, and stealing a quantity of
jewelry and household goods, was brought
before Judge W. Elliot yesterday for
sentence. Hope had pleaded guilty to the
charge and was given two months in jail
at hard labor.

—The talented Mohawk Indian poet-
elephantist, Miss E. Pauline Johnson, will
appear before a London audience for the
first time on Thursday evening, Nov. 16.
Her numbers are of her own com-
position and several of them will be given
by her in native Indian costume. This is
the finest entertainment of the
season and Victorias Hall should certainly
be crowded.

—Ald. Bole, of Winnipeg, was recently
on a pleasure trip, during which he looked
into the municipal workings of various
cities. "London, Ont.," he told the
Winnipeg Tribune, "is the city which
most nearly approached Winnipeg in size
and situation, and he accordingly gave it
a good deal of attention. The water
works in London cost \$100,000, and the
city is now being obtained from
over-falling springs. Last year the total
profits from the waterworks was \$48,000,
and the net profit after paying interest and
\$20,000. At the same time the rates to
the consumer were on an average 50 per
cent. less than they were in Winnipeg."

—"Be Sure You Are Right."

The city solicitors are going slow in the
matter of the lease of the Port Stanley
road. In the lease now in the hands of the
printers, a couple of technical railroad
phrases have been found, the exact mean-
ing of which the solicitors are not certain
about. Not wishing to take any risks they
have asked Engineer Jennings, of Toronto,
for his opinion. They are now waiting a
reply from him. It may possibly be Thurs-
day night before the matter can be brought
before the council.

and while walking on the streets a few days
ago was taken so ill that she had to be

her parents were sent for on Saturday.
Edward, her brother, has remained with
her and her condition was slightly improved.

Among the musical features "The
Black Hussar" has been sung in the very

Tavary Opera Company Coming.

The coming of Marie Tavary and her
grand opera company on Tuesday, 14th,
means grand opera and nothing else. The
company is composed on the lines of grand
opera only. It is new, bright and enthu-
siastic, full of life, vigor and talent, and the
productions are said to be robust, sparkling
and dashing with verve and esprit. Several
of the productions are, especially for the
personnel of the organization, notably
Mlle. Irene Pevny, Royal Opera, Munich;
Baroness Helen von Dönnhoff, Imperial
Opera, Berlin; Emil Steger, baritone, Con-
rad Behner, Imperial Opera, Stockholm,
were secured soon after he came over the
last time. The company number between
70 and 75 persons. Marie Tavary, the
prima, came from the Royal Opera, Munich,
and Covent Garden, London, two years ago
and sang in grand opera here, but arrange-
ments were not completed until now. She
has a brilliant name all over Europe, from
London to St. Petersburg, and is fast mak-
ing a great name all over America. She
was a debutante of La Scala, Milan, and
from her brilliant talents and voice she rose
rapidly, astonishingly so, to a first place.
She is engaged to sing in Europe next
summer, but will return to sing in grand
opera, the entire season following on a tour
to the Pacific coast.

Captured at Last.

High Constable Schram has returned
from a trip to the west, where, with the
assistance of Officer Skirving, of Chatham,
and County Constable Cook, he succeeded in
arresting five men—Bernard Coyne, Wm.
Laird, Wm. Ritchie, John Pleasant and
John E. Smith. The latter three have a
charge of larceny preferred against them,
while all of them will have to answer to a
charge of conspiring to defraud. The
trouble arose out of a foot race between
Laird and Coyne, which took place at
Courtright, Ont., on Aug. 24. Thomas
Reep, a hotel-keeper from St. Catharines,
Michigan, came to witness the race, bringing
with him a good supply of cash. He backed
Laird to the extent of \$800, it is said, and
when the race had been won by Laird,
Reep wanted to get the stakes, which were
held by Pleasant, but Smith is alleged to
have grabbed the money and skipped. A
warrant was issued for the arrest of the
five men, but they got across the river and
went to Chicago, where, it is said, they had
a good time with Reep's money. Word was
received that they were coming to Chatham
on Saturday to stay over Sunday. The
officers laid for them and captured them in
Pleasant's hotel. They were taken to
Sarnia jail and the case was enlarged.

An Old Engineer Dead.

Mr. John Hindmarsh, whose deeply re-
gretted death occurred Saturday, was born
in the village of Renton, Durham county,
England. He came to this country when
40 years ago—and settled in Hamil-
ton in the employ of the Great West-
ern Railway as an engine driver.

He removed to this city the fall after the
road was opened through to London and
has since been an esteemed resident here.
He stood first on the books of the Grand
Trunk Railway Company in point
