The Crisis Is at Hand!

Shafter's Last Offer to the Spaniards Refused.

Take in the Whole Province.

Plan of the Attack Expected To Be Made Today.

Most of the United States Wounded Men Removed From Cuba-Future of the Philippines Much Discussed by the German Press.

Washington, July 14.—Among the best nformed administration officials the opinion is universal that the crisis of the Santiago campaign is at hand. It is deemed certain that today will witunconditional surrender on the part of the Spanish forces, with the chances of both so evenly divided that there is scarcely a toss-up between them. The war officials are hoping for a surrender of the city, and they generally believe that Gen. Toral, the Spanish commander, will yield at the last moment rather than subject his men to what would eventually be a losing fight. He is evidently hesitating as to what course he shall pursue, and as Adjutant-General Corbin, commenting upon . the situation, said:

"The soldier who hesitates is doom-Up to 1:30 o'clock this morning not a word of information that would Santiago had been received by the war department. Both Secretary Alger and Adjutant-General Corbin expressed the opinion that nothing tangible would be received perhaps until afternoon.

Playa del Este, Guantanamo Bay, July 13.-The uneventful truce continued all day yesterday before Santiago, and will continue until noon to-morrow (Thursday). General Toral has rejected condition after condition offered by Gen. Shafter in the face of a threatened renewal of the bombardment. It is thought that Spanish obstinacy is being threatened by knowledge of sickness among the American troops, the facts as to which have probably been exaggerated inside the Spanish line.

THE LAST PARLEY. Gen. Shafter's final proposal to surrender, sent into Santiago, went in the form of a terse note, in which the general pointed out the hopelessness of the Spanish position, surrounded by the American troops, and cut off from reinforcements, and without means to combat the fleet, which can hurl shells by the hundred into the heart of the

THE INVASION OF SPAIN. New York, July 14 .- A special to the Herald from Washington says: Believing that the effect of the appearance of an American squadron on the Spanish coast should be in direct proportion to the strength of the fleet, Secretary Long and the naval war board have decided to strengthen Commodore Watson's command by an additional armorclad, and probably three or four protected and unprotected cruisers.
