Latest Happenings in this Section of the Province.

The hour for closing bars in Woodstock has been changed from 9:30 to 10 p.m.

J. M. Hill, a Woodstock insurance agent, fell over a fence last night and hurt himself. He asks \$1,000 damages from the town.

W. J. Valleeau, superintendent of the Chatham waterworks, has resigned his office, worth \$2,000 per year, to engage in construction work for an American company.

Jas. O'Hara, a Toronto, a brother of Robert O'Hara, master in Chancery, Chatham, and Frank O'Hara, of Baltimore, his son, have arrived in Chatham, there by the serious illness of Robert.

George Mitchell, a Chatham music teacher, was convicted Monday of the robbery of a little girl, to whom he gave a home change after her purchase of a package of needles. Sentence was reserved. The prisoner admitted that while in jail he had broken up a bench in order to keep warm.

Steps are being taken by the mayor of Woodstock and County Attorney Ball to investigate Police Commissioner Allenby's evidence given at trial of Charles Titus some weeks ago. Allenby was asked to resign from the ground that his evidence was open to suspicion, but he refused and demanded a trial.

West Kent license commissioners have granted all the applications of present Chatham holders except four, which are reserved for further consideration. Of three new applicants two have been refused and one held over. In the other municipalities applications have been reserved in three instances. Two were refused.

At Allan's bridge nearly every afternoon a very old lady is looking anxiously over the rail into the water. The cause of her visits is because a few days ago when she was watching the floods of water going over the dam she sneezed and dropped her false teeth. She is 80 years of age, and her teeth were presented to her by her father when she was just out of her teens. They cost \$50.—Guelph Herald.

Christopher Risley, the now notorious forger, acting upon the advice of his lawyer, appeared at the Brantford Police Court Monday, and changed his plea to guilty of obtaining money under false pretenses from the Bank of Montreal there. His money was, however, restored before the arrest, and the police magistrate took a lenient view of the case, sentencing the prisoner to 60 days in jail. Risley looked pale and anxious, and has lost his defiant air altogether. He will be wanted in Pennsylvania, Utah, and other places as soon as his term here has expired.

A BICYCLIST'S FATAL FALL.

Detroit, April 28.—John C. Warkye, Jefferson avenue, manager of the Victor Manufacturing Company, died on Monday night. He was riding his bicycle on Washington avenue Saturday afternoon, when, in attempting to avoid a collision with a Grand avenue car, he had to throw himself from his wheel and struck full length on the pavement. He was 35 years old.

A NOTED FORGER NABBED.

Pittsburg, April 28.—Intelligence has been received here of the capture in Guatemala of John L. Cowan, of this city, who disappeared last February, leaving his friends, relatives, creditors and victims about \$200,000 short. Cowan was in the lumber business, and his victims are scattered over the lumber regions of Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Michigan and Canada. Forgery, note-raising and other forms of swindling are charged against him. Cowan will be brought back to the United States at once.
