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THE BOER
INTRUSION
HAS FAILED

Burned Their Convoy to Prevent
Its Capture.

Baden-Powell Returning Home—Head
of the Constabulary Indisposed—
More Prisoners for Bermuda.

Cape Town, July 4.—The Boer intrusion in Transkei has apparently completely failed. Fouché's commando is hastily retreating over the Drakensberg range. British scouts are following the Boers into the mountain passes. The Seymour and Cathart patrols recently located commandos at Katberg and Winterberg. The Boers, finding the British were alert, retired.

Lategan's commando passed through Elatensfontein, 27 miles from Richmond on Tuesday. The Boers are reported active but in small numbers in the Naauwpoort district, where there has been some sniping. The Boers attacked a post near Barkly West yesterday, but were repulsed, and, burning their convoy to prevent its capture, The British are pursuing them.

BADEN-POWELL GOING HOME.
Durban, July 3.—Parliament is discussing and is likely to pass a resolution declaring that it is desirable to adopt legislation that will allow any individual to acquire the exclusive right to sell liquor.

THE ST. HELENA PRISONERS.
London, July 3.—A report of the governor of the island of St. Helena says: "The lies in the European papers about the treatment of the Boer prisoners even exasperated the prisoners. The latter enjoy large liberties, and are well behaved, contented, and anxious to work. Many of them are employed by the farmers, and others are employed on the roads and wharves."

BOER EXILES START A PAPER.
The Boer prisoners at St. Helena have started printing a weekly paper. The first issue, dated June 7, has just been published. It is a small paper, and is called "The Prisoners of War." A sixth of the space of each issue of the St. Helena paper is devoted to the Boer prisoners. Sporting events are not neglected, however, and a vivid description in English, of a prize fight, appears in an advertisement in the paper. The Boers are employed on the roads and wharves.

LORD ROBERTS TESTIFIES.
Lord Roberts testified before the royal commissioners which is considering the claims of foreigners deposited in the hands of the Boers. He personally investigated the claims of the Boers, and he testified that the Boers were well behaved, contented, and anxious to work. MACHINISTS'
STRIKE OFF!

So Far as the City of Trenton, N.
J., is Concerned.

Seventeen Hundred Freight-Handlers
on Strike at St. Louis, Mo.

MEN'S DEMANDS ACCEDDED TO.
Trenton, N. J., July 3.—The striking machinists today practically decided to call off the strike in this city, the American Bridge Company acceding to the men's demands, and the McKenzie works granting the men a nine-hour day. The bridge company men accepted all the propositions, and they are to resume work the first of the week. The Trenton Iron Company refused the demands of the machinists' union yesterday, and a strike was inaugurated there today.

1,700 MEN OUT.
St. Louis, Mo., July 3.—Striking freight handlers in the railroad yards at St. Louis now number 1,700 men. Of this number 600 are drivers of transfer wagons, who went out in sympathy with the fellow workmen. Not a wheel is moving around the freight sheds, and 3,000 freight cars are in position to be unloaded. Many of them are loaded with vegetables and other perishable goods.

NO AGREEMENT.
Cincinnati, O., July 3.—All negotiations between the manufacturers and the striking machinists have failed, and the representatives of both sides have been unable to reach a satisfactory agreement.

MAY RESULT SATISFACTORILY.
Chicago, July 3.—At a conference between representatives of the National Foundry Association and the Iron Molders' Union the employers asked for time to consider the propositions before a strike should be called. They were granted until Wednesday, July 10.

WOMEN MUST KEEP OUT.
New York, July 3.—The wives of 100 striking longshoremen at Erie, Pa., have been enjoined by the union not to interfere with the non-union men who have taken strikers' places at the Anchor Line ore docks. Five hundred longshoremen are on strike.

THE C. P. R. TRACKMEN.
Toronto, July 3.—The C. P. R. trackmen's situation here and on the lines west of Toronto to Windsor is changing steadily for the company's benefit. THE BRITISH NAVY.
During the debate today in the British House of Commons on the naval estimates, the cabinet ministers were heckled on all sides regarding the condition of the navy. Members asserted that the British Mediterranean fleet was specially inadequate to meet the French and Russian squadrons, saying that it was underequipped, and that it lacked coalers, and the coal depots were all exposed to an enemy's fire. The members generally predicted that in case of war the admiralty would be brought down as completely as the war office did.

H. O. Arnold-Forster, secretary of the admiralty, in replying, referred to the great demand on the admiralty for services in South Africa and China, and promised to strengthen the Mediterranean fleet with new battleships, and to add to the fleet the new cruisers and torpedo boat destroyers.

IT IS STATED THAT REAR ADMIRAL LORD CHARLES BERKELEY is desirous of resigning his command of the Mediterranean fleet, and is desirous of being transferred to the command of the British fleet in the North Sea.

FINANCIAL PANIC IN SOUTH RUSSIA.
Odessa, July 4.—The Kharkoff Commercial Bank has failed with a deficit estimated at 5,000,000 roubles. The failure has caused a financial panic in South Russia.

THE NEGOTIATIONS OF THE CREDITORS' COMMITTEE and the receivers of the Leipzig Grain Drying Company are reported to have been successful. The grain drying company subsequently made an assignment. The chairman, Sumpf, was shortly afterward arrested. The director, Gen. Schrödter, has disappeared.

CABLE NOTES.
Sir Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett offers his creditors 75 c. in the pound. He owes £23,214.

A press representative hears that an American syndicate has purchased the "Compagnie Internationale des Wagons Lits (International Sleeping Car Company) from the Belgian company, and that the business will be transferred to Chicago.

CAUCUS
OF BRITISH
LIBERALS

Tuesday's Meeting of Reform Club
Awaited With Great Interest.

Over 700 Nurses Presented With
Decorations by the Queen—Sultan
of Morocco's Costly Cameras.

London, July 4.—The split in the Liberal party is the one subject of discussion in political circles. Everyone recognizes that next Tuesday's meeting at the Reform Club will be charged with destiny. The fact that the meeting has been fixed for a date ten days earlier than that of the banquet to Mr. Asquith gives ground for the supposition that it has been carefully designed either to make the latter function impossible or else deprive it of any importance. In any case it is perfectly certain that the meeting has not been called in the interests of the imperial Liberals.

LIBERAL IMPERIALISTS MEET.
Probably it was to consider their position in this latest development that Mr. Asquith and his followers met together in one of the committee rooms of the House of Commons yesterday afternoon. At the gathering which was strictly private, the cream of the Liberal Imperialist party was present, but no inkling of what occurred has been allowed to leak out, Mr. Asqu
