DOGS GUARD A HORSE

The Three Animals Range at Large on the Prairies.

Denver, Jan. 22.—An interesting story of animal devotion comes from the Diamond Jewel ranch, a mile south of the Denver University. About three weeks ago a handsome bay horse, accompanied by two dogs, went racing past the home of Col. Tipton, whose place adjoins the Diamond Jewel ranch. Since that time the strange trio has remained on the prairie. Through all the storms and cold weather of the past few weeks the horse, always attended by his dogs, has ranged at will, seemingly the property of no one.

The dogs will permit nobody to go near the horse. At first the dogs themselves would resist any effort on the part of Col. Tipton's family to feed them, but now they go to the Tipton place every day, and the colonel's daughter feeds them. Even at that the dogs do not leave the horse unattended. They go to their meals one at a time. While one is eating the other is guarding his charge.

Col. Tipton says that the horse evidently belongs to someone in Denver. It is a bay, is hands high, with a diamond branded on his thigh.

ROYAL WEDDING FOR FEBRUARY

Several Royalties Will Not Attend Princess Alice's Marriage at Windsor.

London, Jan. 21.—Feb. 10, the anniversary of the wedding of Queen Victoria, has been set as the date of the marriage of Princess Alice, daughter of the late Duke of Albany, and Prince Alexander of Teck, youngest brother of the Prince of Wales. It will take place in semi-state in St. George's Chapel at Windsor, where the present King and Queen were married, and the young princess will be given away at the altar, not by the King, who was her guardian, but by her only brother, the young Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, who, besides being a German sovereign, is a peer of the United Kingdom, though debarred from taking his seat in the House of Lords as second Duke of Edinburgh, and from voting as such by the fact that on succeeding to his uncle's German throne he became a German citizen and surrendered his English nationality. After the ceremony in the chapel the King will give a big wedding breakfast in the Waterloo gallery of the castle, to which the various ambassadors, including the representative of the United States, will be "commanded."

There is no truth in the story, according to which the King and Queen of Wurtemberg, who are among the nearest relatives of the young Princess of Teck, are to be present at the wedding. For although King William is very fond of his Teck cousins, and has been exceedingly kind to them, yet he has never been on friendly terms with King Edward, a fact which has been accentuated by the latter's failure to fulfill the intention and promise of the Garter upon him.

Already a year before Queen Victoria's death she had arranged to confer the garter upon him, and had entrusted her second son, the late Duke Alfred of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha and of Edinburgh, with the duty of investing him with the order at Stuttgart. The duke, however, fell ill and died before he could fulfill the mission, and six months later his mother, Queen Victoria, followed him to the grave. Three years have elapsed since then, and although King Edward has in that time given the garter to the young King of Spain, to the Shah of Persia, Archduke Francis of Austria, the Crown Prince of Portugal, Grand Duke Michael of Russia, the Duke of Anjou, and to the Crown Prince of Denmark, the King of Wurtemberg still remains without any English decoration, not even the Victorian Order.

The fact of the matter is that the two kings have never been friends, although formerly the Duke of Wurtemberg ruler wore a beard he bore a certain resemblance to Edward VII. Their mutual ill-will dates back to the time when both were heirs apparent, and there has never been any reconciliation since.

Nor is it likely that either Queen Wilhelmina of Holland, who is the first cousin and intimate friend of Princess Alice, nor yet the Dutch Queen, Emma, who is the aunt of the princess, will be present at the wedding as announced. For it is no secret that both of them take the view that Princess Alice, with her ranks as a royal princess of England, and possessed of a large dowry—thanks to Queen Victoria's generosity—might have found a far better match than the relatively penniless Prince Alexander of Teck, whose parents are German nobles, in the rank of the minor nobility of the continent.

KNOCKED OFF BRIDGE

Mr. William Aitchison, of Watford, Instantly Killed.

Watford, Ont., Jan. 22.—William Aitchison, foreman of a gang of masons employed in enlarging the bridge on the G. T. R. half a mile east of Watford, was struck by a west-bound special Wednesday afternoon, knocked off the bridge and instantly killed. The deceased was 55 years of age, being a native of Scotland. The late Mr. Aitchison had been a citizen of Hamilton for a long period, and was very much respected by all who came in contact with him. He leaves to mourn his untimely taking off a wife, three sons—James, William, and John, of St. Thomas and William, at home, and one daughter, Mary, at home.

ONTARIO HAS A BIG SURPLUS

The Figures For Last Year Are \$578,000, Making a Total of About \$3,500,000.

Toronto, Jan. 21.—The year's financial transactions by the Ontario Government will be shown to have been most satisfactory, when the public accounts are presented in a few weeks. A preliminary statement prepared yesterday, shows a surplus for the year of over half a million, with three million dollars in the bank at present, and a total surplus of a half-million more.

The statement in detail shows that the total receipts by the Province of Ontario during 1903 were \$5,462,298; total expenditure, \$4,884,298, leaving a surplus for the year's transactions of \$578,000. On Dec. 31, 1902, there was in the bank to the credit of the Province \$1,415,000. A year later, on Dec. 31, 1903, this had increased to \$1,993,827. Since then the revenues received brought the money in the bank on Jan. 20, 1904, up to a total of \$3,094,193.

A glance at the assets and liabilities shows a surplus of \$1,415,000 on Dec. 31, 1903, of \$2,552,827. Counting the increase in the cash received since the close of last year, the total surplus of assets over liabilities at the present time is in the neighborhood of \$3,500,000.

THE KIDNAPPED CHINKS

A Romance of the United States Custom Authorities.

Buffalo, Jan. 22.—Chas. L. Bullymore, an attorney, stated yesterday that he has evidence in connection with the smuggling of Chinamen into the United States from Canada, which he will call to the attention of a United States commissioner. The proceedings will have no connection with the investigation started as a result of the Chinamen given at the recent trial of smugglers at Elmira to the effect that the Buffalo police had been "fixed" if the information I have is correct. Mr. Bullymore is quoted as saying, "Chinese kidnapping is a regularly conducted business, and it ought to be exposed. I have certain information that has been carried on by and with the consent of certain officers whom I will not mention at this time. I time given the Chinamen and conspired which it is proper for me to lay before the court. It is alleged that Chinamen are smuggled all their money on the Canadian side and then brought across the river and turned over directly to officers. They are then deported and the Chinamen are relieved of risk of getting them beyond the border. In one instance it is alleged that the Chinamen were taken into Canada and brought the Chinamen into the United States, where they were placed under arrest."

RIVERS ON THE RAMPAGE

Great Floods Caused by Wash and the Ohio Overflowing.

Lafayette, Ind., Jan. 21.—The Wash River has risen sixteen feet since midnight. All boats, including a pleasure steamer, have been destroyed by the ice. The water has overflowed all the lowlands and is in the cellars of houses in the Miami River.

The Wash is rising at the rate of one foot per hour.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 21.—The White River is out of its banks. The West Washington street bridge here is in danger. At Muncie the Indiana Union Traction Company's bridge has gone, and other bridges have been carried away.

Cincinnati, Jan. 21.—The large ice gorge in the Ohio river, between Ludlow, Ky., and the western part of this city, gave way today. No damage was done here, but lower points have been warned. Great apprehension is felt in the harbor here on account of ice gorges up the river that are expected to break up and be drifting today throughout the Ohio Valley.

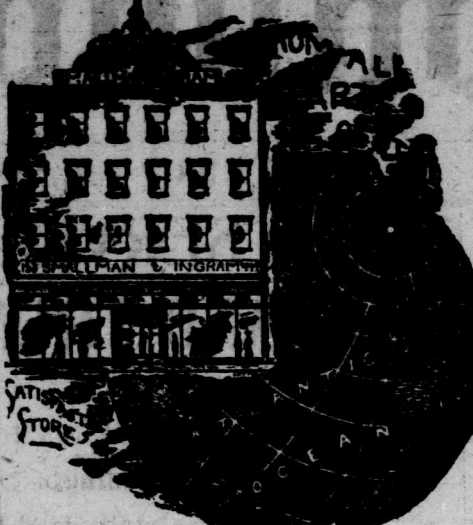
Logansport, Ind., Jan. 21.—Ice began moving out of the Wash River today, doing much damage to property.

Dayton, Ohio, Jan. 21.—An ice gorge, house-top high, has formed at Steele's dam in the Miami River, north of this city, and serious results are threatened.
