## SHOULD UPHOLD PREMIER ROSS

Rev. Dr. Spencer Advises Fellow-Prohibitionists.

Cannot Look Elsewhere for Temperance Legislation.

Thirty Years of Temperance Reform the Splendid Record of the Liberal Party.

The Rev. Dr. Spencer, of Brantford, has written the following letter to the Expositor, of that city: The Brant county prohibitionists held their convention recently and pronounced against putting a third candidate in the field in either riding. It was doubtless a wise decision, and one which many other constituencies might follow with advantage so far as temperance reform is concerned. Where both candidates are opposed to prohibition a third man might be a useful whip, but, on the whole, the extremist cannot be counted on from a prohibition point of view. Mr. Fall-

Both-Ways is still in the land. The situation strikes me thus: We have no parties in our legislative assembly. From the Conservative party we cannot, and do not, expect any temperance legislation. Mr. Whitney has stated his position frankly and fully, and we give him credit and thanks for placing himself where we know where to find him. The majority, the vast majority, of his followers are with him in those deliverances, so that there can be no question that from the Tory party will come no legislation of a prohibitory character. CONSERVATIVES VS. REFER-

ENDUM. Every elector should note this fact carefully and remember that the pledge of the Conservative party is against the liquor act, against the referendum and against all the curtailment of liquor interest as practiced by the Ross Government up to date. As we look through the list of candidates for May 29 we see a few who are known as temperance men, and who, on that question, would do all they could if allowed to promote prohibition. But can they? Mr. Marter has practically been read out of his party for the position taken on this question. He must, henceforth, stand alone. Even if half a dozen prohibitionists were to be found in the same ranks they must subordinate their interests to party position, and denounce the other fellow, no matter how sincerely he may seek to fulfill his promise and give to the public an opportunity of saying what they require. The anomalous position of any candidate or any elector cannot be mistaken, for, while liberately votes for men and party pledged to oppose every effort being made to lessen the drink evil. There can be no mistaking the situation, and at the support of this determined opposition is drinkdom. The liquor interest will spare no party or individuals thereof. The party which can best serve its interests is going to have its support. The track is in for itself first and last and every time. year is going to mean The for or against the moral, social and industrial well-being of Ontario. No consistent prohibitionist, in my judgment, can vote for Mr. Whitney's policy. If he does so vote he had better at once declare himself no longer in harmony with a line a thousand miles long, lay on his progressive policy of improvement. and in making Ontario a model country in temperance reform. It may be said that the Conservative policy is to reduce the licenses and establish greater enforcement of law. How much in the past has Mr. Whitney done in that direction? censes issued in Ontario with a population of a million and a quarter. During the regime of the Liberal party those licenses have been reduced to 2,-950, with a population of two and a half millions. In other words less than half the licenses with more than double the people. Prohibitionists should not forget this reduction, and if the referendum does not carry, the probability, if not certainty, of another reduc-tion. Men in middle life should remember this, for their sons will be affected by the policy of whichever party rules the province in the next and succeeding decades. Voters in the country who are not cursed with a saloon next door to their lovely quiet homes should think not of themselves alone, but of the greatest good to the greatest number. I would urge electors in the outlying districts to do all in their power to help the towns and cities to improve the present situation by voting for the best good of their neighbors as well as their children.

A THIRD PARTY. As to a third party, I am personally inclined to believe that an independent

party might be useful, BUT NOT NOW. We must not swap horses in the middle of the stream. The conventions have attended and the touch with men here and there only go to show that a third candidate will the Reform vote. An independent cannot, and is not going to get one per cent of the Conservative vote, but he may get ten per cent of the Reform vote. That is the hope of the antivote. prohibitionist party. I sincerely hope prohibitionists will not be hoodwinked by any urgency in that direction. The hope of the temperance party lies in the Ross Government and not in the present opposition. Even though the date of the referendum and the conditions there of men not all we could desire, strong prohibitionists must not forget that they are not the only peo-ple to be considered. As a worker in the last two plebiscites I was sadly disappointed with the numbers, even in Ontario, and if we do no better next time we shall be more ashamed than ever. I want to emphasize as much as possible the wisdom, the necessity, the policy of sustaining the present party in power. To them we must look for beneficial legislation in the matter under discussion. their past efforts count for a good deal, and though the referendum is not all I would like it to be I propose to make the best of it, and to abide by the result until something better can be obtained. For these reasons I shall do my best to return the Ross Government to power, and for these reasons feel it to be my duty to urge upon all temperance people to roll up a good

vote on Dec. 4 as well as for the Liberal party on May 29. TIED TO NO PARTY.

I am tied to no party, government position or clerical place, and am therefore free to express my personal convictions and to follow them up by action. By doing this I know I am expressing the opinions of a great many people who feel they have to make choice between that which points in the direction of temperance and prosperity, and that of leaving things as they are, only to grow worse. The great Gladstone said that the drink evil was worse than "war, pestilence and famine combined." Our young and growing country needs the best foundations to be laid, then the superstructure will be comparatively easy. Much might be said of the wonder ful advance made in our province of late years. The growth of trade, the opening up of New Ontario, the development of new industries, the progressive enterprises apparent everywhere, husbanding of resources, the benefits to the working classes, the protection of life and property, and the mutual good-will existing, all of which have been marvelously aided by one of the best governments the province has ever known. Economy and advancement are "writ large" on legislative efforts, some of which have only been inaugurated. This is not the time for change; we cannot, I repeat, afford to "swap" horses in the midst of this swiftly-flowing, strong current of pros-perity. When the stream gets block-ed, or the tide begins to turn, then 'twill be time to call for a change. With all these growing provincial improvements, the record of honest endeavor in temperance reform, the hope of further advantages in the direction of prohibition, the appointment of non-partisan commissioners through county judges, and the elevation of every gov ernment position to dignity and beyond suspicion, we can well afford to return Dr. Ross to power and give him a chance to consolidate the development of the province, much of which is only in its infancy, not the least of which is the moral and social wellbeing of the people. Ross must be sustained.
