This year promises to be the most

successful one in the history of Rugby

in London. In two weeks practice will

begin, as it is necessary to put in six

weeks' work before the opening game,

which will be in the first part of Oc-

tobring until Labor Day a short race.

There is plenty of new material in

town, and as both of last year's teams,

with a few exceptions of a few mem-

bers, will again be in uniform, London

has a splendid chance of winning both

the senior and junior championships.

Gowans, who last year played center

half for the Victorians in both their

games here, has been in town all sum-

mer. He will likely turn out and

strengthen the back division immen-

sely. He is a fast runner and a splendid

kick. Several of the juniors who

showed up last year will catch the

senior team this season.

On Monday, Aug. 14, and each week

following until Labor Day a short race

will be held, beginning with two

miles, and increasing the distance each

week. Every member who intends to

play for this year, whether he is

going to enter into the 10-mile road

race on Labor Day or not, is requested

to turn out for these runs. A prize will

be given to the juniors who show the

most improvement in these prelimi-

nary races or who are going to play this

fall are requested to hand in their

names to the secretary as soon as pos-

sible.

pital, but expects to be able to get
