EAST LONDON MAY SUPPLY SEVERAL ALDERMEN.

A Number of Names Are Mentioned for the Next Municipal Elections.

Aldermanic candidates are beginning to crop up, and it is possible that East London will supply a large number of would-be aldermen.

Mr. John Forrestal served the city for several terms, and will, it is said, enter the field again. He was defeated at the last election by but a few votes, and should he enter the field this time he would undoubtedly make a good showing.

Mr. W. R. Colby announced his intentions of entering the field some months ago. He is interested in East London real estate, and would make a good representative.

Mr. Henry Pocock, of Egan street, will probably run as an independent Liberal. He believes that the independent voters are sufficient in number to elect a candidate who would look to the interests of all classes.

Then the three men who now represent the east end will undoubtedly run again.

Ald. Rose has hinted several times that he might drop out this year, but it is thought that he will again be a candidate on the Labor ticket.

Ald. Parsons will run again. He refuses to make any statement regarding the matter, but does not wish any person to labor under the impression that he has had enough.

Ald. Moorhead will possibly run again. Ald. Parsons denies the rumor which is gaining much ground to the effect that he will be a majority candidate.

Julian Perrin Was Found Guilty Of Assaulting Another Italian

The Prisoner Was Remanded for Sentence By Magistrate Love.

In the police court this morning Julian Perrin, the Italian who on Saturday evening assaulted Peter Pantoloni with a water jug and cut his neck so badly that it required many stitches, was found guilty and remanded to jail until Saturday for sentence.

Pantoloni appeared in court this morning with his head swathed in bandages, and stated that on Saturday evening Perrin came home drunk and accused the boarding house mistress of not being a good cook. He intervened, as Perrin seemed likely to strike her, and then Perrin turned on him and tried to hit him over the head with a water jug.

Pantoloni "ducked" and the jug hit a table and was smashed, the handle, with a sharp end on it, remaining in Perrin's hand.

Perrin attacked him with the sharp

handle of the jug and slashed him across the throat.

In the box Perrin admitted the assault, although he claims the row was the result of an old quarrel between him and Pantoloni.

Other Cases.

Harriet Chrysler, for being drunk and a vagrant, was sentenced to three months in jail.

John McCullough, a drunk, was fined \$2.

Leroy Briggs, a vag from Chicago, was remanded to jail for another week as he says he is too ill to proceed.

James Harris was given another chance, the charge of drunkenness being postponed for a month. If he keeps sober during that time he will be discharged.

William Dyer, charged with stealing an overcoat was dismissed, as he had taken the overcoat while drunk, and was under the impression that it was his own.

James Barrett, a drunk, was remanded for a week.

'Twill Be Col. Campbell of Seventh

Major A. A. Campbell will probably succeed Col. Reid in command of the Seventh Regiment in February next, when his term of office expires.

Col. Reid will not ask to be continued in command, but will retire with the rank of colonel.

Capt. A. A. Campbell will be gazetted senior major shortly, and will be in line for the command. Capt. McCrimmon will be made junior major.

With the promotion of Major Campbell to the colonelcy, Capt. McCrimmon will then be made senior major, with Capt. H. C. Becher as junior major. Lieut. Gordon Ingram will be gazetted captain at the same time the other promotions are made known.

There will also be some changes made in the other offices, when Col. Reid retires. It will result in the promotion of Lieut. F. Andrews and others to the rank of captain.

Capt. W. J. Reid, who has been paymaster of the regiment for many years, will also retire in February, having passed the age limit. It is not known who will succeed him, but it is probable that someone not now attached to the regiment will be given the place.

Some time ago, Major Campbell did not favor accepting the command, but the officers of the regiment declare that he will now accept. He is popular with both officers and men, and will make a first-class commanding officer.

LAYMEN GATHER IN ST. PAUL'S

Great Canadian Movement Opens in Old Cathedral.

J. CAMPBELL WHITE SPEAKS

Says the West Is Passing the East in Matter of Contributions.

The laymen's missionary convention, which was opened this afternoon at 3 o'clock in St. Paul's Cathedral, is in the opinion of local pastors the greatest missionary gathering that has ever been held in London.

For far-reaching results, especially in the field of home missionary work, nothing has ever been attempted here that will compare with it.

Besides large numbers of people from the city churches, it is estimated that between 1,500 and 2,000 laymen and clergy from outside the city will be present at the meetings.

Afternoon Meeting.

This afternoon's meeting commenced at 3 o'clock, and was opened by Canon Dana, who was followed by Mr. J. Campbell White, of New York, general secretary of the international laymen's missionary movement. The session was devoted entirely to devotional exercises.

The real opening will take place tonight in Cronin Hall, when Mr. White and Mr. W. H. Wardrop, K. C., of Toronto, will be the speakers.

Training Institute.

The session will be continued in St. Andrew's Church tomorrow, when at 10 o'clock in the morning a training institute will commence, with the object of showing laymen how to launch the movement in their own locality.

The institute will be conducted by Mr. J. Campbell White.

In the afternoon at St. Andrew's a special meeting for women will be held at which the speakers will be Miss Hester Alway, principal of the United Missionary Training Institute, Brooklyn, and Mr. J. Campbell White.

In the evening at 8 o'clock a mass meeting will be held in the church, at which Rev. Dr. Ross will preside, and Mr. N. W. Rowell will be the principal speaker.

A Big Meeting.

On Friday the meetings will be held in the First Methodist Church, commencing at 10 o'clock in the morning, when a conference to discuss the foreign mission situation will be addressed by Rev. J. L. Stewart, of China, and Rev. J. H. Wardrop, of Toronto.

In the afternoon the home mission situation will be discussed, the speakers being Rev. R. J. Bowen, Rev. C. E. Manning and Rev. Canon Tucker. The closing meeting will be held on Friday evening, when Rev. W. L. Rutledge will preside and the speakers will be J. N. Shenstone, N. F. Davidson and Henry Yeigh.

Mr. White Speaks.

Mr. J. Campbell White arrived in the city this morning from Toronto, having just completed a tour of the Canadian West.

"The West is setting the pace for the whole of Canada," he told The Advertiser. "We thought Toronto and Montreal had established a record last year, but that could not be beaten, but several cities in the West have completely surpassed them in the amounts they have contributed to raise for missionary work. Toronto and Montreal last year undertook to raise \$3 for each person connected with the work."

"The West is particularly alive to the needs of missionary work among the foreign emigrants who are coming to our country. Every meeting was splendidly attended, farmers driving in for miles around. This is the third time they have made it an even \$10. The whole group of cities on the average will raise \$7.33, which is a splendid record. This is a long way ahead of what is being done in London, where they only promised us \$5."

Will Attend to Urgent Business and Then Take a Holiday.

Ottawa, Oct. 28.—A number of cabinet ministers have already returned to the city and a cabinet meeting will probably be held tomorrow. In addition to the Premier the ministers now here are: Hon. Geo. P. Graham, Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon. Sydney Fisher and Hon. Chas. Murphy. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after clearing up arrears of departmental and Government business, will take a brief holiday before beginning preparations for the first session of the new parliament. It is altogether unlikely that members will be summoned to meet before the first or second week in January.

Hon. Charles Murphy's majority in Russell County is 1,183, the largest in the history of the riding. He carried some townships that never before failed to give a Tory majority, thus winning his spurs in brilliant fashion in his first election.
