IN BITTER DEADLOCK ON THE

[Special to The Advertiser.] New York, Feb. 17.—The National League baseball magnates again failed to agree upon a change in the 1910 season after a stormy session at Waldorf today. In fact, the matter was not formally discussed, as it was impossible to secure enough votes to take the matter from the table. President Fogel, of the Philadelphia club, went home after the morning session, and the St. Louis club, attended a meeting, their proxies being left with Charles W. Murphy, of the Chicago club.

MEETING DELAYED
TILL AFTERNOON.

The meeting did not take place until nearly 4 o'clock, because the club had a severe headache, and did not feel like getting up until after the luncheon hour. Then when the magnates tried to get into the room they had used for three days, they discovered that a tea party reservation had been made for that night.

Garry Herrmann, of Cincinnati, finally secured a smaller room, where the magnates crowded until after 2 o'clock, behind closed doors and shut windows. John T. Brush, of the New York club, who had been the morning speaker, returned to the hotel at 11 o'clock, and found that the meeting had been adjourned until Wednesday night, when it was to be held at the Waldorf. It was said tonight that the Chicago and St. Louis clubs do not favor the adoption of either the 1910 or the 1911 schedule as at present drafted, and that if they can have their way there will be some changes, no matter which one goes through. Barney Dreyfuss is utterly discouraged with the outlook. He had intended leaving for Pittsburgh tonight, and it is probable that he will depart in the morning, leaving his short schedule vote with Herrmann. Dreyfuss said tonight that the National League magnates were acting like "a lot of jealous chorus girls," that it was "one grand fight over trivial matters," and that he was going home to attend to more important business.
