ANOTHER ATTRACTION

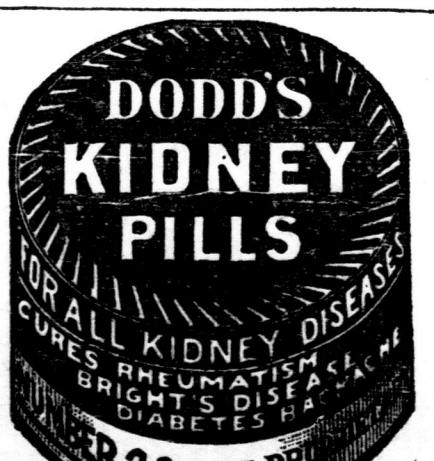

OLD POSTMASTER DEAD.

Delhi, Sept. 12.—James Whiteside, who had been postmaster here for over forty years, and was one of the oldest postmasters in Canada, died at his home yesterday.

MAD INFURIATED MOB

Women and Children Almost Pressed Beneath the Car Wheels.

Montreal, Sept. 13.—The Grand Trunk trains for Toronto yesterday morning, bearing eucharistic congress visitors homeward, was a scene of half infuriated men and women scrambling madly for their cars. Two women fainting, three suit cases were lost, with innumerable umbrellas and small articles.

For half an hour the fight continued, women and children being pressed almost underneath the wheels of the train. The scramble for places, which amounted almost to a panic, needed the presence of a Grand Trunk constable and two porters. Even then the fight could not be prevented. Nearly all concerned were Toronto people.

In the opinion of railway officials it was the maddest scene which has taken place at Bonaventure station in many years.
