### RUSSIA WORRIES HER TWO ALLIES

Reorganization of Army Shows Tendency to Wield Big Stick.

#### RICKY FOREIGN POLICY

Russia Has Little in Common With the Other Members of the Triple Entente.

St. Petersburg, July 11. - While Russia's position in the triple entente is viewed with mingled feelings of bewilderment and distrust by Britain and France, her partners, there is little mystification about her foreign policy to the man on the spot. The first significant factor in the situation here which strikes the observer is the re-birth of the Russian army, a fact of potent influence to Minister of Foreign Affairs M. Sazanoff, whose diplomacy rests in the last re-sort on the ability of his country to

eld "the big stick." Ever since the disastrous war with Japan recruiting for the army has been going on apace, and I have it on the authority of military experts that the units are healthier than they ever were before in mind and body. the present moment there are 1,450,000 men under arms, though only 880.000 would be available for service, the rest of the army being engaged in miscellaneous duties in various parts cars that try to escape.

The pressing need of today is for more money, so as to enable Russia to dispense with the employment of soldiers upon work which in other countries is done by civilians to increase the number of timeexpired men among the non-commis-

It is upon the successful forging of a powerful and highly equipped military organization that the foreign policy of this country will depend and more forceful and direct notes will be heard in her diplomatic communibe heard in her diplomatic communications when that end is reached.

tle in common with the other two members of the triple entente, which has as its ostensible object the elimination of the causes of war and the maintenance for the time being of the status quo. However much foreign observers may think to the contrary, Russia's foreign policy does not change and has not changed. It is based on curious Old World treaties she intends to enforce, and governed by a variety of interests which cannot be properly harmonized with the existing interests of Britain and France. Persia may yet supply the breaking point between Russia and Britain. The Czar's advisors complain that the English Government wants to constitutionalize Persia, whereas Russia wishes to see a strong one man rule in the land of

the lion and the lamb.

Turkey is the centre of possible mischief between Russia and France. French financiers have sunk a whole pile of money in Ottoman undertak-ings, which have been flourishing passably well with hope of greater prosperity in the future. Strained relations would instantly arise between the two countries if Russia put her diplomatic weight into the scale ngainst Turkey whenever pourparlers tere commenced for ending the irco-Italian war.

Coming to the Far East, where Jepan once blocked Russia's way, there is now no obstacle to her aspirations, as the two countries are leagued together for their common agrandizement. The natural riches Mongolia will jointly be exploited by the two allies, who will work together with the other powers of Europe to force upon China the policy of the open door for imperial and commercial ends.

The girls were the Misses Gariette, 44 Knox avenue, who were out in Ashbridge's Bay in a punt when the storm came on them unawares.
