POLICE FIND NEW TURN TO HAMILTON MYSTERY

Only One Girl Made Ill by the Alleged Poisoned Candy of Mrs. Bruce.

[Canadian Press.] Hamilton, Aug. 15 .- Witnesses who will be called to testify at the inquest on Ziepe, victim of the mysterious poisonas a result it was impossible today to clear up certain points in the case, upon which the police refused to give information.
