We have captured all he artillery of this corps.' The following offical communication from the army of the Caucasus was issued tonight: "In the region of Kara-Urgan the fighting is developing with the advan-

tage resting with our troops. By a bayonet attack we annihilated the Fifty-Second Turkish Registent, the survivors of which, including the commander and several officers, wer made prisoners.
"In one directio, where we were pursuing the defeated Turkish troops, we

took more than 5,00 prisoners, 14 cannon, an enormous quantity of supplies and nearly ten thousand head of cattle."


