CANADA FACING PROBLEM IN FUSING OF THE RACES

Country Giant Melting Pot For
Sons of All Nations, Says
Dr. Woodworth.

"We have a commission in Canada to look after the wheat crops, lumber, and even pigs. It is about the government of our country for human beings," said Dr. J. S. Woodworth, of Winnipeg, secretary of the Canadian Welfare Association, lecturing in the Majestic Theatre on Sunday afternoon on "Immigration Invasion." He outlined the steps that the Government should take to begin with settling in Canada the "Melting Pot"—the West, where, he showed, the greater proportion of the 400,000 immigrants to Canada really are settling.

"We mix all these people together and what are we going to get? This is the biggest question before Canada today," the speaker declared. "Provision for the unemployed and the utilization of the foreigners' knowledge and willingness to work; the efficient teaching of English to all the people in Canada and the education of the foreigner in citizenship and not by machine politics, were some of the things immediately necessary if the mixture of scores of varying types and nationalities is to be prevented from causing grave danger to Canada's future," the speaker said.

Canada's Future. "Although Canada's future in social ideals, politics, religion, her standard of living and education, her customs and her people who come to this country, and especially from Southern Europe, and Asia, yet, if the people have strong enough to bring all these people together harmoniously can be found splendid things may result," Dr. Woodworth said.

The questions, according to the speaker, which Canada must consider are these: What are we going to do, racially a few years hence? What type will predominate? Will this country remain separated and be weak, like Austria-Hungary, because the people are not mixed? Are we going to develop a caste system? What will our social ideals be? What will our religion and politics be and what type will predominate?

"The customs of the East endanger our high standard of living," the speaker pointed out. "The Southern European comes from quiet villages; he leaves his wife and family home and lives in Canada like a single man, and he is according to the customs of the wages necessary only for a single man."

What They Bring. "On the other hand, the immigrants bring: untold riches. Most of them are strong and willing to work. Many come from lands where the soil is rich and the climate is good. These men are already taking their place in the universities beside our Canadian scholars."

"The trouble is that we do not conserve the labor of these men. Instead of the Government placing them on undeveloped lands, where they would eventually make good, they are allowed to walk the streets of the cities out of work. It is not the immigrant's fault that there is no work for him," Dr. Woodworth said. "We are making Canadians of the immigrant too quickly. They are picking up all the worst side of our life. An incident which the speaker related, which happened in Winnipeg, gave point to this fact. A young Slav, anxious of being a Doukhobor, asserted stoutly, 'Me no Doukhobor—me swear, me drink me Canadian!'"

"We should give these immigrants the best in the land instead of the worst, for in many parts of Canada the future of the country lies in the immigrants rather than in the Canadian. Canada is not predominantly British at the present time."

"The West is the melting pot of the country. Ontario was a heart of Canada, but there are hundreds of thousands of people running east Ontario to the United States. The name Ontario is nothing. Many of them never heard it before. We are importing Europe to this country, and today Europe is dying in blood because the people, after 2,000 years, have not been able to overcome their racial differences. What is going to be the result of this? The mixture of scores of nationalities are settled, and they are coming at the rate of 400,000 every year?"

A Gigantic Problem. "When will the pot begin to melt? A deaconess is sent with a few hymn books and an organ into the midst of these foreigners to solve the problem of bringing them together. The deaconess is to be admired," said the speaker, "but the problem is a multi-

terrible figures of infant mortality. In Montreal alone in one year 5,355 babies had died, two-thirds of the deaths being preventable. In one ward in Winnipeg, there were 282 infant deaths out of 1,000, within a year, yet in another ward, where families lived like human beings should, only 111 out of a 1,000 had died. From an economic standpoint alone these figures were appalling. In Ontario in 1909, 6,332 babies were buried, at a cost of \$50 each. A total in cold figures of \$316,600. Yet these babies could have been saved at an estimated cost of \$5 each.

Dangers Encountered. Another problem of the immigrant was health. The speaker said that the Government officials endeavored to turn back undesirable from the Dominion ports, but could only estimate physical defects. Mental deficiencies were harder to discover. By means of a chart once more, Dr. Woodworth placed some startling facts before the audience, showing that while mental defects might escape one generation, they were almost sure to affect the third. The speaker deplored the present system of sending children of feeble-minded parents into foster homes, where though they might seem normal, upon marriage were apt to raise families mentally deficient.

Dr. Woodworth pointed out the danger of allowing Oriental labor to supersede white labor in Canada. Oriental labor is under no obligation to Canadians or the decent foreigner. It was not giving the laboring man a fair chance to bring up his family, when the Oriental cut-prices were accepted in preference.

"Last Post" Sounds At Soldier's Grave. Pte. W. Houghton, of "A" Company, 33rd Battalion, who died in Victoria Hospital on Friday night from spinal meningitis, was buried Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock with full military honors. The men of his company, in the 33rd Battalion, held the funeral cortege which was held from the hospital to the grave in Woodland Cemetery.

"Last Post" was sounded over the body and a firing party carried out the last of the military service over the grave, after Rev. R. J. Bowen, who officiated in the absence of Rev. Arthur Carlisle, the chaplain, had read the funeral service.

Pte. Houghton was only nineteen years of age and died after a two-week's illness. Before he enlisted he had worked on a farm near Wingham. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Peter Hunt, of this city, and Mrs. Charles Stewart, of Lucknow.

"DRY CANTEENS" FOR EVERY MILITIA UNIT. Announcement Made at Ottawa Becomes Effective at Once.

TORONTO, April 4.—"Dry canteens" for every militia unit in Canada are to be established by the Department of Militia and Defence. Official notice was received at the headquarters on Saturday afternoon from Maj.-Gen. Hughes.

The notice stated that it was an advance copy of a general order which would be issued by the department. It announced that a dry canteen would be established for each unit of the Canadian expeditionary force and also for each unit of the active militia during the period of training.

These canteens are to be organized, administered and carried on under the supervision and the direction of the officer commanding each unit and a committee appointed by him. The canteens are to be inspected daily.

The canteens are to be maintained solely for the use and benefit of the units, and are not on any account to be a bar.

SAY CANADIANS VIOLATE NEUTRALITY. Protest Sent to Washington Because Men in Uniform Violate Detroit.

DETROIT, April 4.—Owing to the fact that many Canadian soldiers in uniform visit this city from time to time a unique situation has arisen over a protest being sent to Washington on the grounds that they are violating neutrality. The question was laid before the immigration authorities, who declare it is not their duty to interfere, and it is thought it will now pass to the Secretary of War.

Whether Washington will declare that these soldiers should be interned if they do not stay home is a point that is arousing considerable interest.

COLORED BARBER SHOOT HIS WIFE, THEN KILLS SELF

Jealous Husband Draws Gun on Woman in Heated Altercation.

THOUGHT SHE WAS DEAD

Negro Looks At Prostrate Form, Then Takes Own Life.

In a fit of jealous passion, Levi Corcoran, aged 35, a colored barber, drew a heavy .32-caliber revolver from his hip-pocket, and after shooting his 21-year-old wife through the left shoulder, as she was about to flee from the kitchen of a house at 425 Bathurst street, occupied by Fred Harris, turned the weapon on himself, and fell dead with a bullet wound in his right temple, shortly after 11:30 o'clock Saturday night.

The girl, Gertrude Corcoran, is lying in Victoria Hospital, her nerves terribly shaken by the fatality, and suffering intense agony from a burning pain, when the bullet plowed its way through her body. Physicians say she will recover.

Will Not Hold Inquest. Coroner A. MacLaren, who has the case in hand, declared last night that an inquest would not be held. Only four persons—the girl, Mrs. Hackett, Corcoran and Harris—were in the house when the shooting occurred, he said.

Evidence went to show that the shot which resulted in Corcoran's death was fired from a weapon of his own hand. The remains were taken to the undertaking rooms of Smith, Son & Clarke, Dundas street.

Although the police hold the theory that the shooting was the result of a jealous husband's suspicions, hospital authorities are inclined to take a different view of the tragedy.

Corcoran, for some years past had been subject to epileptic fits, and on several occasions had been taken to the hospital in a frenzied condition. At such times his condition bordered on insanity, and it is thought that in a spell approaching madness, he entered the house, and on slight provocation, fired at the woman.

Afraid To Go Home. According to a report told to an advertising reporter at the house where the shooting occurred by Mrs. Hackett, who resides at the Bathurst street house, the victim came home from work early in the day. Together they had walked to the downtown district. It had been arranged that Corcoran was to go to his work in the evening, and take her home.

During the day Mrs. Corcoran confided to her friend that she was afraid to go home. Her husband was carrying a large gun, she said, and of late had used threatening language towards her.

At night the family and Mrs. Corcoran had assembled in the kitchen, when Corcoran entered. Mrs. Hackett stated she is positive the man was not under the influence of liquor. She noticed that he looked nervous.

"Where's Gertrude?" he asked, in a surly tone. Mrs. Corcoran answered him from a chair across the room. She was trimming a hat.

"Come on home," were his next words, according to Mrs. Hackett.

"I don't want to; I want to go to church in the morning."

"You're coming home," was the husband's ultimatum, she said.

The man's hand was nervously reaching to his hip-pocket as he spoke, it is said.

Mrs. Hackett says the young woman hesitated then declared she would not leave the house.

Fired Twice at Wife. At this point Mrs. Hackett declared, the man seemed to lose control of himself. He whipped a big revolver from his pocket, and leveling the gleaming weapon at his wife, pulled the trigger. There was a crash and a ripping sound as the missile buried itself in the wall beside the woman's head. She gasped and the man fired again, this time with effect.

The bullet landed full in the girl's left shoulder.

"Oh, I'm shot!" she is said to have gasped, and fell to the floor. Corcoran looked down at his wife for a moment, then with an exclamation of surprise, he reported upon the death of his wife.

"My God, she's dead," he placed this to his temple and fired.

Called "Crazy." Mrs. Hackett, "but I don't think he was dead. I said: 'You are a crazy man, Levi.' Then he stooped down, hit her against my feet. I touched him, and the truth came to me in a flash. He was dead."

Then I told my husband to run for the police. I turned to Gertrude. She was breathing, although faintly. When the policeman came, he sent for the ambulance, and Gertrude was taken to the hospital.

Patrolman Robert Holden was the first officer to reach the scene of the shooting. He was patrolling a Dundas street beat, when he saw a man running towards him. The man was Harris, in whose house the shooting had occurred.

Summoned Police. "A woman's been shot," he gasped, and the officer started at a run for the house. He arrived at 12:10 o'clock. Patrolman Holden at once notified the police headquarters, and the motor was sent to the house on Bathurst street. The wounded woman was breathing with great difficulty, and believing her to be dying, she was rushed to the hospital.

At Victoria Hospital yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Corcoran told an advertising reporter of the shooting. There was no provocation, she declared. Neither was there any grounds for jealousy.

"We grew up together as children in Branchtown, Ont., where my people moved and we were married. I knew that Levi had a violent temper, and that he was subject to epileptic fits. But he was never troubled that way after we were married."

Carried a Gun. "Several times he threatened my life for no reason at all and within the last few weeks he had carried a gun. He had it with him day and night, and I never felt safe when alone with him."

"Saturday night I went to Mrs. Hackett's place, and when he came for me at night, looking so strange, I became frightened again. When he asked me to come home, I said I wouldn't. He pulled out a gun, and before I could scream, he fired at me. The bullet went over my head, but the second one fired directly at me, and I was wounded."

The Corcorans lived at 36 Glenwood avenue. The dead man was in the employ of G. W. Taylor, barber, whose place of business is at 145 King street. Neither had any relatives in this city.



BODY OF NEGRESS FOUND IN HARBOR

Owen Sound Woman Missing Since November—Husband In Jail.

OWEN SOUND, April 4.—The body of Mrs. Hezekiah Porter, the colored woman who mysteriously disappeared on November 26, last, was found yesterday afternoon in the harbor, just opposite the Grand Trunk station, partially frozen in the ice. The discovery was made by two young men, Anthony Evers and Charles Woolrich, who saw the woman's arm exposed. They at once notified the police and the body was removed to the morgue, pending the action of the coroner.

After the jury viewed the body, Drs. Howey and Frizzell made a post-mortem examination.

Dead Before Reaching Water? The doctors were non-committal as to what the post-mortem revealed, except so far as stating that there was very little water in the lungs, which might indicate that the woman was dead before reaching the water.

Further than this, though, the doctors would not disclose.

Husband In Jail. Hezekiah Porter, the husband of the woman, who was placed under arrest on a charge of vagrancy after Mrs. Porter's disappearance last fall, is still in jail, having been sentenced to four months. He had threatened her several times, it is alleged, and their quarrels during last summer and fall up to the time of her disappearance annoyed the neighbors.

RUSSIAN BOAT IS TORPEDOED IN CHANNEL. LONDON, April 5.—A Russian bark, the name of which is unknown, was torpedoed yesterday in the English Channel, according to the Daily News, which says the fifteen members of the crew were saved.
