TRUCK PLUNGED INTO RIVER WITH DRIVER

Joseph Duncan Had a Narrow Escape From Drowning.

SARNIA, Sept. 2.—Joseph Duncan of Detroit had a narrow escape from drowning in Black River, Port Huron, today, when a motor truck which he was driving on board the ferry "City of Sarnia," got beyond his control and plunged through the opposite side-rail of the boat into the river, carrying the driver with it. Members of the crew immediately went to his rescue and succeeded in bringing him ashore where first aid methods were applied. Later, Duncan was removed to the Port Huron Hospital, but attending physicians stated that no serious results would ensue and that he would be able to return to Detroit. The truck is resting on the bottom of the river, but will be easily salvaged. He was on his way to Hamilton.

BIG STEEL WORKS REOPENING HONDAY

LONDON, Sept. 2.—(By Canadian Press).—Further signs of a revival of industry in Great Britain are apparent. Palmer's steel works at Jarrow, which have been closed down since the first week of the recent stoppage of work in the coal mines, will be reopened next Monday. In the Cleveland district two iron works, which have been idle since last March, will also start up again shortly. This will involve the opening of the Ironstone mine at Ayrton.

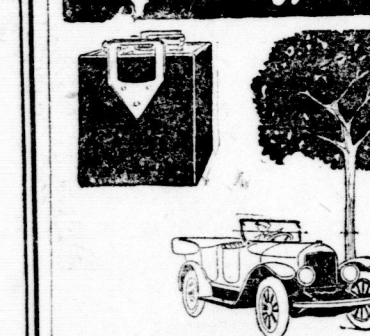

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VETERANS URGE GOVT. WORK FOR UNEMPLOYED

Meighen Tells Soldiers That Plans Are Under Advisement.

TORONTO, Sept. 2.—Premier Meighen passed an active day following his announcement that he would go to the people. He delivered two speeches at the Canadian National Exhibition, heard a soldiers' deputation regarding the necessity of getting work started to relieve the unemployment situation and in the evening held a conference with his political followers.

The premier assured the soldiers who saw him that his Government had plans under advisement in which he hoped to be in a position to make an announcement within a few days. The cabinet, he declared, had been fully advised of the importance of keeping certain public works in operation during the winter.

ESSEX LIBERALS ARE CONFIDENT OF EASY VICTORY AT POLLS

Announcement of Election Is Received With Delight in Border Cities.

[Special To The Advertiser.] Windsor, Sept. 2.—The announcement of Premier Meighen that a general election will be held in December was hailed with delight and satisfaction by leaders of the Liberal party and William C. Kennedy, the popular member for North Essex.

Mr. Kennedy this afternoon said that he welcomed the contest. His organization, used to such effort four years ago in the wartime election, when Brig.-Gen. E. S. Wigle was so badly defeated, still is intact and can be put in the field at 24 hours' notice.

William Woollett, president of the Tory party in this riding, conferred with the premier regarding the situation at the border. Although Mr. Woollett declined to disclose the nature of the premier's advice, he intimated that a candidate will be chosen at an open convention to be held within a month.

Reports that a candidate will be put in the field because the north riding is a "sure-thing" for the Liberal member, were denied by Mr. Woollett.

Winter, former mayor; Col. H. R. Casgrain and William R. Woollett, he said, are all willing to throw down the gauntlet to Mr. Kennedy.

WILL CLEAR THE AIR.

[Special To The Advertiser.] CHATHAM, Sept. 2.—A. B. McColg, M. P. for Kent, stated today that a general election, as announced by Premier Meighen in London, would more or less clear the atmosphere and that the outcome, no matter what it might be, would produce beneficial results to agriculture and every kind of industry.

"I cannot criticize the Government in deciding to go to the country," stated Mr. McColg to the Advertiser. "From one end of the Dominion to the other conditions are and have been very unsettled. After the election I believe that the Dominion will generally settle down to hard work. There will be more encouragement for enterprise and further development of our land. Practically every line of work has been more or less marked time. With a general election had been delayed it would have meant another year before conditions could be righted. When the fiscal policy of the country is known I feel sure we will see a general improvement in trade conditions, and the problem of dealing with the unemployed will be made easier. I have no hesitation in saying that prospects will be brighter both for agriculture and every kind of industry."

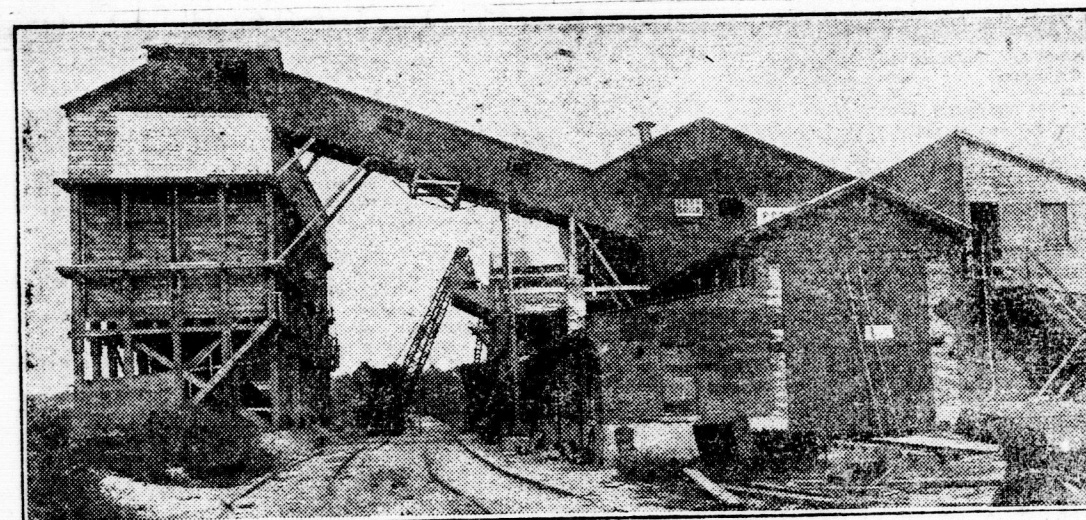
