GOVT. WORK FOR UNEMPLOYED

Meighen Tells Soldiers That Plans Are Under Advisement.

TORONTO, Sept. 2 .- Premier Meighen passed an active day following his an-nouncement that he would go to the people. He delivered two speeches at the Canadian National Exhibition, heard a soldiers' deputation regarding the necessity of getting work started to relieve the unemployment situation and in the evening held a conference with

in the evening held a conference with his political followers.

The prime minister assured the soldiers who saw him that his Government had plans under advisement on which he hoped to be in a position to make an announcement within a few days. The cabinet, he declared, had been fully seized of the importance of keeping certain public works in operation during the winter.

Tells of Conference.

The premier addressed an audience of thousands of exhibition visitors from the central bandstand this afternoon at 5 o'clock and stirred them deeply with an eloquent and earnest exposition of the recent imperial conference and the growing significance to the dominions of Empire connection. The premier made scant reference to the coming political battle, concentrating almost wholly on the recent conference of premiers in England, disarmamment, naval power and related international interests.
