

OFFICIAL OPENING OF NEW WING AT WORTLEY RD. P. S.

Bazaar Held by Mothers' Club in Aid of Children's Hospital.

COMMUNITY CENTRE

Inspector Greer Advocates Use of School For Social Activities.

The official opening of the new four-roomed wing of the Wortley Road School yesterday was marked by a bazaar, held in the afternoon by the Mothers' Club in aid of the Children's Hospital, and a reception in the evening given by the Mothers' Club and teachers of the school. The result of the activities of the day was over \$50 raised for the hospital, and an increased interest aroused in that district for the school as a social center.

Mr. Greer, local school inspector, in addressing the gathering last evening, expressed the hope that the school would be made a community center for the amusement and educational activities of the district. He didn't see any reason why the people should have to go downtown for their amusement. Mr. Greer said that the school should be a "Parental Club," in which fathers and mothers should work together with the teachers of the school and the members of the school board in the interests of the children.

Splendid Co-operation. Several members of the school board were present and spoke briefly on the splendid co-operation between the teachers and parents in the Wortley road district. Trustee Thos. Coleridge, chairman of the board, referred particularly to the new auxiliary classes which have been opened at the school this fall for the instruction of sub-normal and super-normal children. This class, now being conducted by Miss Hay, one of the most efficient teachers along this line, had an enrollment of nine pupils, and with the co-operation of the parents in the district could be made most worth while in the community.

Trustee Mrs. W. A. Tanner referred to the splendid work of the Mothers' Clubs in the city. The first club, she said, was organized in the Wortley Road School 23 years ago, since that time the Mothers' Club movement had spread, not only throughout the city, but throughout the Dominion of Canada. She referred to the fact that the Wortley Road club had held the banner as the largest club in the city for several years, losing it last year by but two members. The new four-roomed wing of the school was the outcome of a petition to the board from the Wortley Road mothers three years ago. Other speakers of the occasion were Edwin Smith, A. N. Udy, D. E. Egert and Mrs. John L. A. Hunt. A splendid program included vocal numbers by Mrs. Ed. Wyatt and J. McCormick, and dramatic readings by Miss Topey-Thomson, Mrs. Richmond, president of the Wortley Road Mothers' Club, and Mrs. Smythe, one of the teachers, acted as hostesses for the evening.

EMPRESS AVENUE. Miss Lawrence, a teacher at the Empress Avenue School, was the speaker for the first autumn meeting of the Empress Avenue Mothers' Club, held at the school last night, her subject being "Co-operation Between the Home and the School." The speaker was of the opinion that mothers should help in the education of their children by sending them to school fit to take in what was taught there, that is, by insuring that they have plenty of sleep, good food and fresh air. Children were retarded in their studies through scanty sleep in poorly-ventilated rooms.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES IN 8 MONTHS TOTAL 1,469

Measles and Chickenpox Lead—No New Typhoid Cases.

To the end of August the city has harbored 1,469 cases of communicable disease. The month of August produced 150 new cases, and the previous total for the year was 1919. As usual, measles and chickenpox rank first, with 469 and 228 cases each. Then come the more serious or dangerous ones, with diphtheria leading this section with a total of 182, and scarlet fever next with 144. Typhoid fever led all in August in the matter of new cases with 53, the outbreak at the Hospital for the Insane sending this total up. Diphtheria came next with 32 victims, and tuberculosis with 21. Diphtheria is still rampant, as the report on communicable disease for the week ending September 17 shows five new cases, while no further cases of typhoid were reported.

LONDON'S ZOO PRAISED BY HUMANE INSPECTOR

Inspector George Tustin of the London Humane Society, gives the Springbank zoo a clean bill in so far as care of the animals and birds housed there is concerned. The following clipping from the columns of the Humane Standard, official publication of the Toronto Humane Society, is self-explanatory: "Reg to report that the animals at the London zoo are visited by me from time to time, and am pleased to report that every time I have visited them I have always found them O. K., and in a clean condition. The bear pits are cleaned out every morning; and the animals are in good, healthy condition; plenty of water in every pen; and a man employed for looking after the animals; and every animal looks fine. In case of sickness a doctor is at once called and all care is taken of the animal. During the last twelve months I have not received a single complaint."

RIOT AT VIENNA BOURSE. Vienna, Sept. 21.—Serious disorders occurred in this city yesterday following the closing of the bourse. OFF THE RAILS

BEET SEASON OPEN.

This week will see the opening of the sugar beet season as far as all roads in Western Ontario are concerned. The G. T. R. moved several carloads today from the counties of Essex and Kent to the sugar factories in Chatham and Wallaceburg. The season on the Pere Marquette opened last Monday, while the C. P. R. expects to begin hauling beets by the end of this week.

Officials of the G. T. R. report that the crop of beets all through Western Ontario is as heavy as it was last year despite the fact that last season established a record. The average this year is not quite so great, owing to the dissatisfaction of many of the growers over last year's prices. The Pere Marquette alone expects to move 5,000 cars of beets, while the C. P. R. expects at least 1,300 cars as their allotment.

The Progressive Sugar Company, a new concern, with a proposed capitalization of \$2,000,000, is endeavoring to establish a plant at some point in Southwestern Ontario. If their plan succeeds it is expected that the acreage of beets in Western Ontario will be greatly increased next year.

P. M. R. IN MICHIGAN. A normal crop of beets and an unusually good one of potatoes were produced by the business during the next few months for the Pere Marquette in Michigan. It is estimated that at least 10,000 cars of beets will be moved in that state this year.

ODDFELLOWS' SPECIAL. Four hundred Oddfellows left this city for Toronto at 5 o'clock this morning, via a special C. P. R. train. The train formed a first section of No. 20. A return special will leave Toronto for London this evening, it is expected.

JUDGING COMPLETED. Judging of the flower beds and the decorative garden plots of the various stations and sections of the C. P. R. has been completed, and the prizes will be awarded by the end of this month. Each year the C. P. R. in this district offers eight prizes for the best kept lawns and gardens in the vicinity of the various stations and sections of the company's lines. As the competition is always keen the company's right-of-way is greatly beautified through the efforts of the employees.

LONDONER WILL GET CHIVALRY DECORATION

J. Kirkpatrick Among Those To Be Honored by Oddfellows.

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—A proposal to organize a juvenile branch of the I. O. O. F. for members between the ages of 16 and 21 was presented to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the order today by delegates from Minnesota. The proposal, which was embodied in the suggestion that the branch be given its own governing council. For years there has been a strong body of the order working for the lowering of the minimum age limit from 21 to 16, and the Minnesota measure is designed to meet this demand. It was referred to the committee on legislation, who will report tomorrow or on Thursday.

Would Lift Ban. Another proposal, emanating from the Illinois delegation, was that subordinate lodges be permitted to resume the use of foreign languages in their ritualistic exercises. The adoption of this suggestion would lift the ban imposed shortly after the United States entered the war, on the use of German in the order.

The Minnesota representatives also gave notice of a bill for the establishment of a tuberculosis hospital for the treatment of Oddfellows or members of their families.

Representative S. H. Page, of Pennsylvania, proposed an amendment to the code to permit grand encampments to authorize non-beneficial subordinate encampments to expend funds for the amusement of the members of the order.

PRE-NATAL INFLUENCE STILL HAS ADHERENTS

While some may scoff and laugh over tales of pre-natal influence, there are still those who firmly believe that such influences on a mother will be visited upon her offspring in some form or other, mostly in the form of birthmarks.

The matter came before the board of health at its meeting Tuesday afternoon, when a petition was being raised to the fertilizer plant hauling dead horses through the streets. One of the reasons given was the influence it had, and the belief that it might attend, if an expectant mother was forced to look upon such spectacles from day to day.

Chairman Cunningham hastened to set the complaint right. He declared that he believed in the influence of the mother, and hence taboo. He said that the conclusion had long been reached by authorities that it was other things which produced birthmarks, etc.

The man accepted the explanation of the chairman with a smile, but he went away with a frown.

SASKATCHEWAN'S WHEAT CROP 145,082,000 BUSH.

Regina, Sask., Sept. 21.—On a seeded acreage of 10,353,000 acres, the wheat yield of Saskatchewan this year is estimated by A. E. Wilson, Dominion grain commissioner, to be 14 bushels to the acre, making 145,082,000 bushels.

OFFICIALS ELECTED.

As the result of the amalgamation of the Canadian Express Company with the employees' organizations of the two roads, both of which were branches of the C. R. E., were united into one big, country-wide organization. At the recent conference of the representatives of the two unions held in Winnipeg it was decided that the new organization would remain true to the Canadian Brotherhood, despite the actions of the Canadian Trade Congress in revoking the charter of the national organization.

At that meeting, N. L. Preston, formerly chairman of the general grievance committee for the employees of the National Express Company, was appointed general chairman of the same committee for the new organization. Albert H. Ball of this city was appointed general secretary, as well as vice-chairman of the grievance committee for the central division, which stretches from Armstrong to Montreal. The appointment of Mr. Ball to the position of general secretary has brought considerable distinction to the local branch of the union, M. Dundas of this city, formerly chairman of the general grievance committee of the Canadian Express, elected honorary vice-president of the C. R. E. in Ontario.

Because the company was unable to present the proposed new scale of wages and working conditions to the employees when they met in Winnipeg, the present scales of both companies were extended until October 15. It was the intention of the union to end the present agreement on September 15. A meeting will be held in Montreal at the end of this month, it is expected, to discuss the new scale of wages and working conditions.

ANNUAL TOUR.

The Pere Marquette Railway's annual tour of the lines is scheduled to start on October 21, and will continue for the ensuing nine days without a break, according to the present plans. Heretofore the inspection trip has taken a period of two weeks, due to the tying up on Friday over the Sunday intervening between the first and second half of the tour. This break is to be avoided this year.

A good deal of discussion regarded the appointment of a man from an outside point to the position of secretary, province, and the position of the present secretary was formerly a member of the local organization and was transferred to the London command from Windsor. One of the members took the floor and discussed the appointment in very clear language and started quite a controversy, which ended by him saying: "Well, whatever I have to say on anything regarding G. W. V. A. circles I say it right here in the club rooms, I don't preach it on the street corners like A. E. Johnston of Pine Lawn."

The Right Man. "The present secretary has done very good work for the association," declared Col. Coles, "and, since he has been appointed, 51 of the old members have returned to us and six new members have been added to our roll. I am sure he is the right man for the position and I think you will all see it in the same light."

It was stated at the meeting that it is not necessary for old members who have dropped out to pay another initiation fee if they wish to join up. They will be required only to pay dues from the time their records are cleared.

Service Ribbons.

A resolution was passed that Col. Coles call on the head of the police and fire departments to ask permission for the men to wear service ribbons on their uniforms, and all former wars, on their uniforms.

Another resolution was also passed that the local G. W. V. A. send a letter of condolence to Lady Hughes in connection with the death of her husband, Lieut.-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes. It was stated that it was a little late to send the letter, but that this meeting was the first held since his death.

Opinion Expressed by M. O. H. at Meeting of Board of Health.

Is the statute making it obligatory on the part of physicians to report cases of venereal disease being rigidly adhered to?

Some seem to think that it is not, and base their conclusion on the fact that a few cases are being reported. On the other hand, there are those who claim that the scarcity of new cases is evidence that the spread of the disease has been checked.

Speaking at the board of health yesterday, Dr. Downham said that the total number of new cases reported for the week ending September 18 was five cases of syphilis. Dr. Downham, in his report for August, said there were six new cases during the month of August.

The previous total of the two diseases when added brought the eight-month total for August to 112. The venereal disease clinic report to the provincial board of health for the month showed three cases admitted to the hospital.

G. W. V. A. SKEPTICAL RE AMALGAMATION

Local Command Wants To See Benefits Under Proposed Union.

The first general meeting of the local G. W. V. A. since the installation of the new officers for the year was held last night in the new club rooms over the Majestic building on Dundas street.

Colonel W. G. Coles, president of the organization, was very much pleased with the exceptionally large turnout, and expressed hopes that the association would stick together and attend the meetings a little more regularly than they have done in the past.

Comrades Ireland and Bates were elected to the executive committee by vote, and Comrades Gibbling, Williams, Ryder, Menzies and Noble were elected to the house committee by acclamation.

Nearly Starved. It was moved and seconded that a letter be sent to General Manager E. V. Buchanan of the public utilities commission, stating that the G. W. V. A. would fall in line with the city council and render the veterans of the city aid in obtaining employment. It was stated that work on the public utilities commission was being done mainly by veterans, and that the city council was not in need of the money, when returned soldiers and other residents of the city could not get work at any price. It was claimed that some veterans nearly starved to death during the winter months of last year.

The amalgamation question was brought up, but it was decided to let it "hang fire" until it was seen what would be done by the various organizations at the coming Dominion convention. "It is up to the other soldier organizations to show what benefits can be derived from amalgamation before we will express ourselves," said Colonel Coles, "and, as a part of the G. W. V. A., I think they should come to us and not have us go to them. If they want amalgamation, let them have it, but let them be amalgamated under the G. W. V. A. This was the first returned soldiers' organization and, moreover, it has done more regarding the fair distribution of pensions and other work among the soldiers than any other organization that I know of."

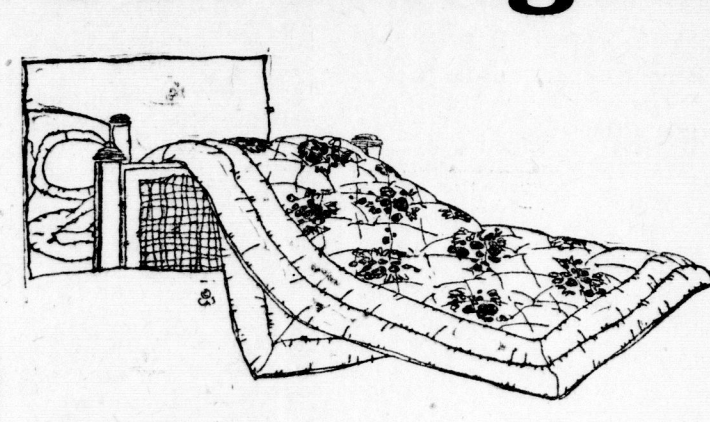
PAID \$5 FOR WATCHING BIG BASEBALL GAME

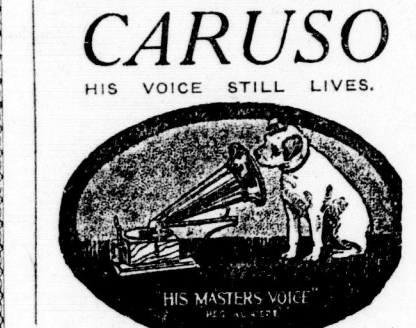

JURY SEEKS SOURCE OF ARBUCKLE BOOZE

Seven Witnesses Questioned But No Indictments Returned.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—Seven witnesses were questioned today by the federal grand jury in an attempt to learn the source of the liquor consumed at the affair in Roscoe C. "Fatty" Arbuckle's hotel suite here, from which resulted the death of Miss Virginia Rameau, and Arbuckle's arrest on a charge of murder.

"No indictments will be returned until all of the federal department's investigating in the case have completed their several investigations," announced Robert H. McCormack, assistant United States attorney-general. The investigation will be resumed by the grand jury Friday, he said.

Important Witnesses. Today's witnesses were Mrs. Bambi Maude Delmont, Miss Alice Blake, Miss Zeke Prevost, Mrs. Max Taube, who were present at the party; John P. Pickett, a bell boy at the hotel, and Miss Josephine Kessler, a hotel maid.

Mrs. Delmont swore to the murder complaint against the film comedian, and Miss Prevost was the woman whose statements to the police caused Arbuckle to be booked on a murder complaint.

Joyce Clark, another member of the party, was subpoenaed, but was not called today.

"We simply wanted their testimony perpetuated in the event any witnesses should leave the city and to prevent a conflict of testimony in case any of them should desire to leave before the case might be brought to trial," McCormack said.

Subpoenaed Sherman. A telegram to Lowell Sherman, a participant in the affair, was sent today to Chicago by District Attorney Matthew A. Brady, asking Sherman to come to San Francisco to give his version of the affair. District Attorney Swann of New York also was notified by telegram to intercept Sherman if he arrived there, and keep him under surveillance. Sherman was subpoenaed as a grand jury witness before he left Los Angeles for Chicago. Assistant District Attorney Milton U'ren said he hoped Sherman would leave voluntarily, and not cause legal steps to be taken against him.

The authorities announced today that they believed that May Parsons, another woman who had been in the Arbuckle party, had been located at Fort Worth, Texas. Chief of Police O'Brien asked the Fort Worth authorities to detain her.

RAISES OBJECTIONS TO CANADIANS' LOAN

Claim Is Made That Deal With the Chinese Republic Is Against Concertum.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Canadian Press Cable.—The Times correspondent at Peking says that important issues have been raised by the agreement recently signed in that city, by which a Canadian banking syndicate will lend the Republic of China 2,000,000 gold dollars against one-year bonds secured on various enterprises. It is noted that the discount and interest give a return to the Canadian investors of a rate exceeding 20 per cent per annum.

The correspondent says that the transaction seems to be in order, except that the concertum of the powers formed to regulate the question of a loan to China has not been consulted, and that the loan is a direct negation of the British Government's policy in China. It is pointed out, however, that the Canadian Government is not a party to the concertum agreement between Great Britain, United States, France and Japan, and feel under no obligation to observe its terms. Nevertheless, foreign parties to the concertum will naturally take the view, says the correspondent, that if the Canadian loan goes through the British Government will be subscribing to one policy with the right hand, and to a totally different policy with the left. The concertum management must end if all parties to it do likewise.
