# ARCHBISHOP OF Hold Third 'Wilson Brother' In \$1,000,000 Theft CLOAKS ILLEGAL ARTFUL GUISE

Downfall of Shillington Fails To Deter Activities of "Bookmakers."

IGNORE PASTORS' PROTEST

Mythical "Odds" From Track Where Betting Is Illegal Still Featured.

Despite the protests of London elergymen—the fact that Section 235, Chapter 10, of the Dominion Criminal code, reads:

"Section 235, chapter 10: It is an offence to send by mail any infor-mation relating to bookmaking, pool-selling, betting or wagering, etc. The sender of such information by post is therefore guilty of an offence, and if the department has knowledge of it, must, in accordance with the criminal code, refuse to transmit such mail" and—the fact that the downfall of Harold W. Shillington, charged with the theft of \$75,000 in stocks and securities from a London financial institution, is alleged in usually well informed circles to have had its inception in the loss of thousands of dollars, "playing the ponies" with local "bookmakers," prior to his flight to Boston, and from there to Manchester, England - a morning newspaper, after abandoning the open publication of racing "tips" and "selections," emanating from the fertile brain of a sporting editor, fo.lowing the London Advertiser's exposure of January 11, has resumed the practice under skilled camouflage, to the detriment alike of the unwary youths of the community and the 'sport of kings.'
