LABOR PROTESTS PROPOSED REPEAL

Up in Arms Against Move of No. 2 Committee Regarding Holiday.

TAKE UP CUDGELS

Organized labor in London is up in arms against the move of No. 2 committee of the city council to repeal the bylaw, whereby outside workers of a year's standing are permitted two weeks' vacation with pay. Their complaint will be brought before the city fathers at the next regular session.

Meeting last night, the Trades and Labor Council voted to take up the cudgels for the garbage collectors' union, members of which would be most affected by action to repeal the vacation bylaw. A year ago, after some fight, outside workers in the city's employ, were able to get the holiday provision made for those who had seen at least a year's service. Recently, however, action was started by No. 2 committee to have the holiday section repealed.

The matter will be put to the city council when consideration will be asked by the labor men, who point out that other leading cities have made vacation provisions for their workers.

14 MONTHS' OLD BOY STRANGLED TO DEATH

Is Pinned To Back of Bed by Heavy Iron Cross-piece.

Sarnia, June 13.—The fourteen months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Holm, this city, lost his life by strangulation in an extraordinary manner last night when he climbed out of his bed and succeeded in pulling onto him a heavy iron bedstead which was standing between the child's bed and the wall. One of the iron crosspieces of the bedstead pinned the child by the throat against the wooden back of his own bed, and unable to move or cry out, owing to the pressure of the windpipe, he died where he stood. There he was found by his mother who came into the room some minutes later.

Dr. McDonald was called and pronounced death due to strangulation and no inquest is found necessary.

Public Schools Close.

Breadalbin, N. Y., June 13.—The public schools here were ordered closed for the remainder of the school year today, when a member of this year's graduating class was reported ill with smallpox. One other student is said to have contracted the disease.

The car was driven by Clarence Pepper, 24 Wellington street, and the unfortunate man was endeavoring to avoid being hit by one car when he walked into the path of one driven by Pepper. Coroner Montiech has decided that an inquest is not necessary.

Declares Childless Marriage Contributes To Degradation of Family Life.

APPEALS TO DUTY

Advises the Young Man To Steer Clear of Divorce Courts.

Marriage without children is a contributing factor to the degradation of family life, and the consequent decay of the state, Bishop Williams declared last night in an address at the annual banquet of the Huron Club, an organization of young men in connection with All Saints' Church. The bishop was one of two guests of honor, whose addresses featured an unusually successful program. Hon. Dr. Jamieson, chairman of the agricultural committee of the provincial legislature, and a lifelong friend of the rectory of All Saints' Church, Rev. A. A. Bice, was the second speaker, informing young men who had taken up their life work in the city of the problems which confronted other young men who were taking up life in the rural districts.

The degradation of the family life today, Bishop Williams declared, was taking place as a part of a voluntary policy on the part of numerous parents. Marriage without children he characterized as simply a gratification of human desire, in complete neglect of the fact that the prime duty of the institution was the procreation of children who were to be brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

Issues Warning. He uttered a vigorous warning to the young man not to pattern their lives on the example set by a large number of people in the United States, speaking particularly with regard to the prevalence of divorce in that country.

"I hope," he said, that you will all be on your guard against taking your point of view from the prevalence of divorce in that country, and instead, consider Canada where divorces are few and far between."

The bishop based his address on the three institutions in which human life is cast, the family, the church, and the state. All three of these, he declared, were distinguished from other institutions, since they were upheld by the sanction of the Lord.

"As long as the family life is sacred, the nation is strong and secure, as long as Rome kept her family life pure, she was strong, but with the decay of the family life came the decay of the Empire."

"The purity of the family life is a guarantee of safety; degradation is a symptom of decay. The decay of family life in the country, he declared, were distinguished from other institutions, since they were upheld by the sanction of the Lord.

Continuing to the third point, Bishop Williams stated that there was a tendency to forget the divinity of the state, and the fact that it was sanctioned by God.

"What makes a good citizen?" he asked, "goodness or cleverness? We can have a clever rogue, but if a man is innately good he is a good citizen, and if he is good he has faith in God. Without faith in God what motive has a man in living, because then only two questions are left, profit or loss, pain or pleasure. What kind of a world would we have if we were governed of men who thought only of avoiding loss and pain and coveting pleasure and profit? Would we have won the war if thousands of young men had not put duty before either profit or pleasure as they did?"

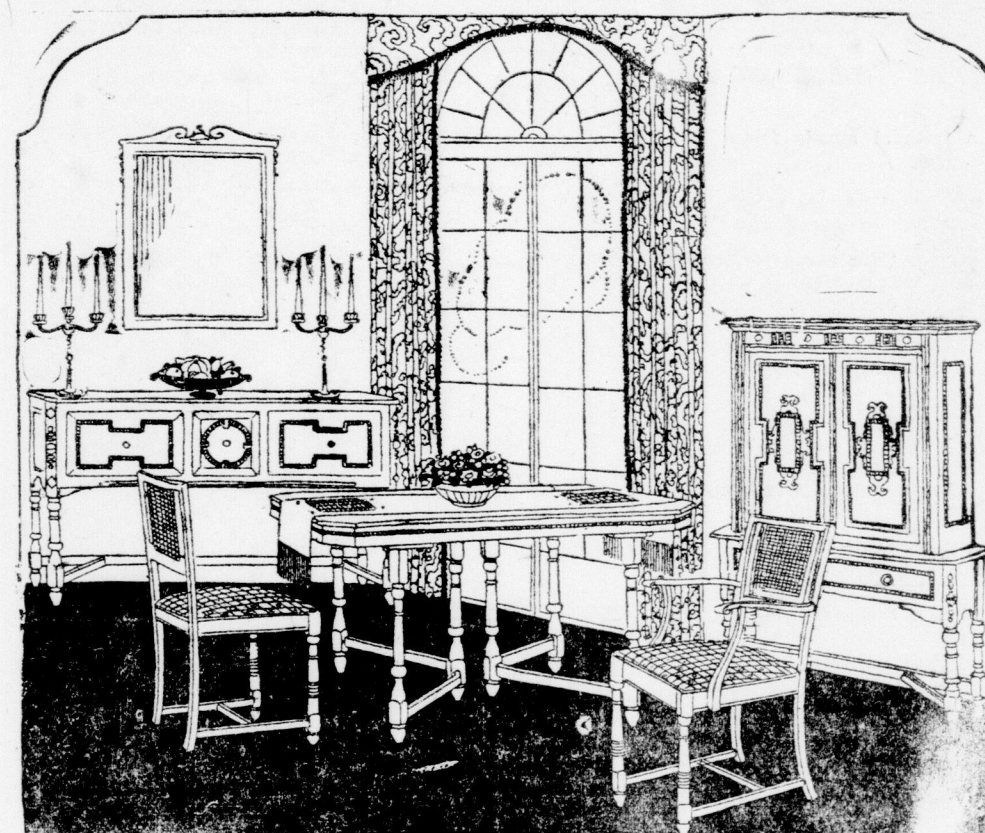
GOVERNMENT WILL PAY THIRD OF BRIDGE COSTS
