

History of Church.

"In October of the year 1874, the trustees of the North Street Church chose a site in Westminster Township for a Methodist meeting house, and awarded the erection of the edifice to Mr. Thomas Green, who rushed it to completion. Prior to, and during the months it was in process of building, the services of the talented and now sainted Dr. Fresham (a converted Jewish rabbi), were procured to hold services in the old Askin school house. Dr. Fresham, by his zeal and indefatigable labor, advanced the cause of Methodism by bleaps and bounds. His efforts may be better understood when the fact is known that his first congregation amounted to six in number. Under his ministration God prospered it abundantly, and all longed for the day when their new church would be ready for occupancy, as the old school house was far too small to hold their increasing numbers. On the second Sabbath in January, 1875, it was arranged to hold the first services in

Halifax and Vancouver, and the sucess and wellbeing of the church that day might be attributed in a gree measure to the ladies of the congre This account deals with the church up to the year 1905. During this period the following pastors were in charge: Rev. J. B. Edmunds, Rev. Thomas Collin, Rev. George Brown, Rev. R. J. Treleaven, Rev. A. Langford, Rev. Robert McIntyre, Rev. Thomas Cullen, Rev. Richard Hobbs, Rev. James Holmes and Rev. W. G. Howson, and the later pastors were Rev. Alfred Brown, Rev. W. H. Harvey, Rev. Dr. Dougall and Rev. T. J. Cosby Morris. During Dr. Dougall's pastorate a new parsonage was erectpastorate a new parsonage was erected at a cost of \$6,000, and under Mr. Morris the Sunday school buildings and auditorium have been erected at a cost of \$25,000.
