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COUNCIL BACKS CREDIT OF \$50,000 TO L. & P. S.

Mayor Wenige and Alderman Neely Only Opponents of Motion.

SCALES UNCHANGED
New Market Equipment to be Built on Present Site.

The city council last night decided to grant the London Railway board the \$50,000 credit for which it had asked. J. P. Moore, one of the commissioners, appeared before the council explaining why it was needed at this time of the year to take care of purchases before the summer recess came. Only the mayor and Alderman Homer Neely voted against it.

On the vote on the position of the new city scales, Ald. Smith and the mayor were the only members to vote against the present site. The scales will be built on the present site in spite of recent controversy. Hon. John Martin, provincial minister of agriculture, came in for sharp criticism by Ald. Neely. In a recent letter to the trades council here the minister stated that there was no provincial fund to establish settlers on the land in New Ontario.

Ald. Neely quoted Col. W. R. Smythe of the department of colonization to the effect that there was a provincial fund of \$50,000 for this purpose, and added: "If the minister would take the trouble to cross the corridor to the office of Col. Smythe he would know this. I would move that the council send this letter back to him, and draw his attention to his ignorance of the real state of affairs." The council, however, decided there was nothing to be gained from attempting to educate a provincial minister on his own specialties.

When the matter of the housing commission came under discussion and the appointment of a salesman considered, the mayor made himself plain.

There is nothing wrong with our housing commission," he said. "The only thing wrong is that common nuisance, the press. If we appoint a live-wire salesman now we can recoup all our losses."

He announced during the evening that he had received a letter from Premier Ferguson saying that no action would be taken to remove Harry Wray, assistant in the government employment bureau here.

Tenders for the new pumps for the fire department were to be in by Wednesday of this week. On the motion of Alderman Frank McKay, which was adopted, the time will be extended to Wednesday, May 27, to give further time to some makers who had not received the specifications. These specifications will not be changed, as was suggested at the last meeting of the finance committee.

Bylaw Referred.
Two bylaws in connection with the public utilities commission, were referred to the finance committee on the mayor's request. One was for \$75,000 for electric light works, and the other was for \$99,000 for waterworks purposes. The mayor said he wanted to discover whether the assets of the commission were increasing in proportion to their debt issue in recent years.

BROTHERS STAND TRIAL FOR MURDER IN QUEBEC
Men Extradited From U. S. Will Be Tried in Montreal.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Montreal, May 18.—Charles and Francis Alken must stand trial here on a charge of murdering George Benton at St. Bernard de Lacolle in May, 1924, according to a judgment delivered this afternoon by Mr. Justice Wilson in the court of king's bench. Benton died from wounds in a hospital at Plattsburg, N.Y., a few days after the shooting. The Alken brothers were arrested in the United States, extradited and lodged here in Bordeaux jail.

His lordship's decision today was to the effect that Canadian courts have complete jurisdiction in the matter. The brothers were arraigned immediately. They pleaded not guilty and then trial was fixed for May 26.


