FLYING FROM FAMINE

Fully a Thousand Residents of Dawson Are Now Making Their Toilsome Way to the Coast.

Some Had Only Reached the Klon dyke Before Turning Their Faces Toward Home Again.

The prophecy of old miners that the wilderness road from the Klondyke back to civilization will be marked this win ter by dead men's bones, is now all too certain of fulfilment. For by the steam er City of Topeka, arriving Sunday morning from Lynn Canal, the news is received that more than a thousand illprovisioned men stampeded from Dawson during late October, and impelled by the haunting fear of famine are madly

forcing their way over the mountains. Auk, the Indian mail carrier, who brings this news, left the Yukon capital some days after Jack Dalton's party, and says that the vanguard of the terror-stricken army is following less than a week behind him. He passed many on his way out, not a few of them men who had just reached the Klondyke after en-during innumerable hardships on the journey inward; and speaking from long experience of the country and its winter conditions, declares that a large percentage of the stampeding mob will never live to recite the terrors of their flight

from death.
