

Mr. E. P. Davis Now Opens the Case for the Defence.

THE CASE FOR PLAINTIFF IN

All Evidence of Claimants Presented in Famous Le Rol Trail.

Mr. E. P. Davis Now Opens the Case for the Defence.

The Case for the Plaintiff was concluded Tuesday by Mr. Bodwell in the trial of Williams v. the B. A. C., now proceeding in the Supreme court, before Mr. Justice Drake. During the morning the cross-examination of Valentine Peyton, the millionaire witness, was completed by Mr. Davis, and the evidence of a number of other witnesses was taken. In the afternoon Mr. Davis opened the case for the defence, contenting himself for the present with a few very brief remarks and the submission of reports of the proceedings of commissions held in London.

Mr. Davis tried to secure from the witness an admission that he had suggested to Dally, Durrant and other B. A. C. officers, giving him \$5,000 or \$10,000 to buy out the shares of the company, which were held by Mr. Mackintosh and himself. J. G. English gave similar testimony, and in cross-examination he admitted that he had not entered in the conversation he had with Governor Mackintosh, in which the latter had recounted the terms of the agreement.

The evidence of Frank Graves, taken under commission at Washington, then put in. It set forth that the Turner interests sold finally at \$8.12 per share.

Resuming in the afternoon, Mr. Duff read to the jury the report of examinations of various papers which were a bearing on the trial now proceeding. Mr. Bodwell also put in papers in connection with the case, which were the matter of the wills of Messrs. Shed and Source, shareholders, who have since died. With this Mr. Bodwell announced that this was the case for the plaintiff.

Mr. Davis wished to make the contention that the defendant disputed that Mr. Mackintosh had any authority from the company to sign the agreement referred to in the matter would be dealt with later on. Mr. Davis did not think it necessary to indulge in a lengthy opinion, the defence was plain—a contradiction in two of the claims urged by the plaintiffs. The evidence, he thought, showed some serious contradictions; they would find that the greater part of the evidence for the defence was corroborated by written documents.

Mr. Davis then proceeded to put in the evidence taken under commission at Spokane and London; also the examination of Valentine Peyton before a commission. Mr. Bodwell entered an objection against the admissibility of any evidence which aimed at the limitation of the authority given by the B. C. court to Mr. Mackintosh. Many questions put to witnesses were objected to by Mr. Bodwell and noted. On the question of the limitations of Mr. Mackintosh's authority, Mr. Davis wished to put in a resolution passed at a meeting of the B. A. C., claiming that it showed more conclusively than the mere power of attorney what the authority was. A memorandum authorized the appointment of Mr. Mackintosh as managing director, but not to engage in any transactions involving an expenditure of \$5,000, without consulting the company.

Mr. Davis read the evidence, which was very voluminous. Mr. Wright testified that Col. Peyton had told him the would sell for \$6 per share and expected nothing more.

Mr. Davis had not concluded when the court rose at 4.30 to sit again Wednesday.
